"Your liable to have a serious accident. The fine will be \$15."

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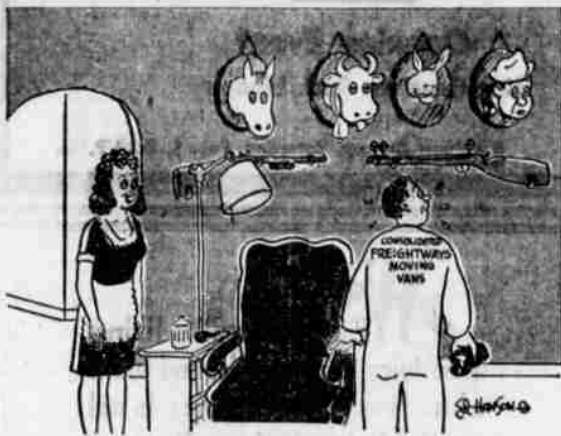
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News of 4-H CLUBS

DENVER, Jan. 29. (AP)—Six or seven million more persons will move westward as the South continues to become more highly mechanized, in the opinion of Jonathan W. Daniels, author, newspaperman and former White House secretary.

"The political furor in Georgia over the governorship was a good sign the south is moving," Daniels said last night. "The Claghorns are no longer in control in the South."



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M'Kellar Levels Morals Charge at Official of TVA

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28. (AP)—Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.) told a Senate committee today the Tennessee Valley Authority paid \$2,478.33 in 1938 and 1939 for travel expenses of a "high officer" of TVA and a woman employee who, he said, engaged in "illicit relationships."

The senator made his statement as the committee began its fourth day of inquiry on President Truman's nomination of Gordon R. Clapp to be a TVA director.

Asked by Clapp to identify the TVA employee, McKellar said to do so would be "rather painful" since they were a married man and an unmarried woman. He told Clapp to examine TVA records for the names.

Clapp replied that he could not recall such a case off-hand, adding that TVA does not attempt to control the morals of its individual employees.

TVA, Clapp declared, would not have authorized travel expenses for any reason other than official business.

"What employees who travel on official business might do in their personal affairs is something else," he said. "However, if it reflected on the reputation and efficiency of TVA, TVA would take action if it had the evidence."

Asked by McKellar if he would rather examine the matter in private before it might be made public, Clapp replied he would do so only because "it might save what may be some innocent employees from the effects of gossip."

Portland Vice Purge Fails to Halt Burglaries

PORTLAND, Jan. 29. (AP)—Gambling, booze and illegal drinking establishments in the city are closed, the new head of the police vice squad announces.

Lt. L. P. O'Halloran, who organized a vice squad last week with instructions to clean up the city, said the city is "closed tighter than I have seen it" in 21 years.

He said his 14-man squad had been working around the clock in three shifts.

A long list of burglaries continued to plague police, however. One, the so-called "Party" burglar, used a garden hose to pull a purse from a bedroom. Another forced open a window with a shovel. More conventional means of entry were used by several others.
