Liquor, School Issues Confront Legislature

boys is being drafted by Reps. O. H. Bengston, Medford; J. O. Johnson, Portland; Paul Hendricks, Salem, and Sen. Thomas Parkinson, Roseburg, all members of the Legislative Interim Committee which recommended the new institution.

The bill, carrying out Governor Snell's recommendation on the subject, has been introduced in the Senate. The Senate measure would let counties or cities set up camps for first offenders from 12 to 18 years of age with state support.

Rep. Bengston said his committee wants a single statewide school, and that counties and cities would have trouble staffing several schools or camps.

One state school or camp could set up the necessary training, discipline and recreational program, as well as meet the segregation problem, Bengston said.

The House passed and sent to the Senate yesterday a bill to segregate senile patients at the state hospital from mentally-diseased patients.

Amending of the rural school district law to include all first class districts will be sought in a bill to be introduced by Rep. French. The rural school district law was passed at the November general election.

A resolution asking Congress to continue to make enough appropriations to provide additional federal generating capacity on the Columbia River, and asking Congress to maintain existing low electric rates at Bonneville was introduced in the House.

The Senate Revision of Laws Committee has voted to introduce a bill sponsored by the State Civil Service Commission, to classify more than 6,000 state employees in civil service jobs they now hold. The commission said blanket acceptance of present workers would save the commission several thousand dollars and facilitate administration.

Would Boost Truck Taxes

The house roads and highways committee voted to increase taxes on trucks by \$1,000,000 a year, and to standardize these taxes on a mileage and weight basis. The tax would range from 3.75 mills per mile for light trucks, to four cents per mile for trucks over 44,000 pounds.

The committee recommended passage of bills to repeal the four-year-old law requiring the secretary of state to require registration lists of motor vehicles, and to have drivers' licenses expire on the birthdays of the licensees. Rep. Joseph E. Harvey, Portland, said he would introduce a bill to let each precinct have local option, which now is limited to counties and cities.

The joint ways and means committee, hearing from the state racing commission that racing receipts would be fairly stable for the next two years, indicated it might recommend increasing the

state's share of racing bets from 3 to at least 5 per cent by reducing the operator's 9 1/2 per cent share.

School Bills Approved

The senate education committee has recommended passage of a bill to let school districts increase their indebtedness to 10 per cent of the assessed valuation of property within the district. The limit now is 5 per cent and the committee added a two-year limit to the bill.

Other bills approved by the committee would let school boards make changes for use of school buildings, repeal provisions which forbid dancing in schools, and reduce bond requirements of clerks of high school districts.

A bill to outlaw advertising of notices of professional services by beauty schools or beauty shops was introduced today. Such advertising would be grounds for revocation or suspension of licenses by the State Board of Cosmetology.

Gentlemen:

In order to clarify your position regarding the vital problems of timber sales and forestry practice, we respectfully petition a public answer from you on the following:

1. Your definition of sustained yield.
2. Declaration of policy regarding:
 - a. Financial ability of buyer.
 - b. Size of operation of buyer in the past four years.
 - c. Other timber holdings of buyers in the past four years.
3. Public report of all timber sales for the past four years. To include:
 - a. Purchaser.
 - b. Legal description of timber.
 - c. Price per thousand board feet.
 - d. Terms of payment.
 - e. Cruise of each tract sold.
4. Declaration from you on your policy as to timber sales.
5. Do you have contracts with O. & C. Lands Administration?
6. Your opinion as to whether sustained yield is legally enforceable or strictly voluntary.
7. Do you have a clause regarding sustained yield in either the county deeds of transfer or contracts of sale?
8. What provisions are there as to taxes in contracts of sale?
