U. S., Britain Too Late in Warning Poland on Election

American and British representations to Warsaw over the Polish election set-up serve merely to help keep the record straight. It is too late now—has been too late ever since the Moscow-dominated government was established.

Regardless of what the rules and regulations for voting might be, the Poles have been given some very concrete lessons in how to vote. Thousands have been jailed on various excuses stemming from the fact they have been too overt in support of Vice Premier Mikolajczyk's Polish peasant party. Others have been "detained" by authorities who sought to convince them they were "mistaken" in signing nominating petitions.

We can only surmise what "persuasive" methods have been used, over and above the normal threats of loss of jobs, etc. It apparently worked well enough, however, to give the government an excuse for voiding opposition tickets in 10 of the country's 52 districts after a sufficient number had recognized their "mistake" and withdrawn their signatures.

The government also has organized a militia whose duty at the polls will be similar to those of the poll-watchers put out by some political machines in the United States. The Polish watchers, however, have some considerable advantages. They are armed, militarily trained, and openly represent the government.

Boycott Idea Abandoned
In the face of all this with which we have become familiar through watching eastern European elections since the war, the Polish peasant party has decided not to boycott the election, preferring to make the best showing possible.

Whether a boycott, as some feared, would have hastened the trend toward civil war in Poland is a question. But the atmosphere among the 2,500,000 voters in the 10 districts left without a choice of tickets will be watched closely. So will the reaction among other millions who will be frustrated at the polls Jan. 19 by fear, technicalities and actual overt acts.

Russia May Horn In
What might happen if several million peasants and the armed underground decided to take things into their own hands is hard to contemplate, especially if it resulted in Russian military aid for the Warsaw satellites.

When the U. S. and Britain protested a similar election situation in Hungary some months ago, Russia replied that we were seeking to interfere in Hungarian internal affairs. Now the Russians say the only irregularities in Poland are committed by "rightwing terrorists" call the election set-up "perfectly democratic," and so kiss off the suggestion that the Big Three keep their agreement that Europe's people shall live under governments of their own free choice.

To many Poles this choice must seem restricted to:

A vote for a foreign-sponsored government whose continuation could bring economic sanctions by the western powers and a resultant shortening of rations.

A vote for the Polish peasant party, almost certainly to be followed by penalties from Warsaw, and quite possibly by a crack over the head.

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Hostilities End Of No Effect On Most Vets' Laws

President Truman's recent proclamation ending hostilities has had no effect on most of the laws administered by the Veterans Administration, T. A. Collins, contact representative at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, announced today.

Foremost among these is Public Law 346, the GI bill.

Collins explained that VA has held that the date of the official termination of the war, rather than the cessation of hostilities, is the determining factor in establishing the deadline for the educational, loan and readjustment allowance provision of the GI bill.

The same ruling applies to vocational rehabilitation under Public Law 16 for disabled veterans, Collins stated.

Under the GI bill, loans may be guaranteed or insured by VA up to 10 years after the end of the war. Education or job training may be started up to four years after the war. Readjustment allowances for discharged veterans expire two years after the war's end.

Disabled veterans eligible for education or training under P. L. 16 face no specific deadline but they must complete their training

within nine years after the end of the war.

In non-service connected death and disability cases, rights depending on war veteran status alone, such as hospitalization, domiciliary care and burial allowance, will be accorded only to those who served between Dec. 7, 1941, and the date of the president's proclamation Dec. 31, 1946.

Also affected, the VA representative said, are Army and Coast Guard cadets and Navy midshipmen. They no longer have an active duty status for the purposes of laws administered by the VA. Therefore, their service after December 31, 1946, as cadets or midshipmen may not be credited for veterans' benefits.

The VA ruling specified that wartime rates of compensation will continue to apply to service connected disability and death cases for members of the armed

forces until official termination of the war.

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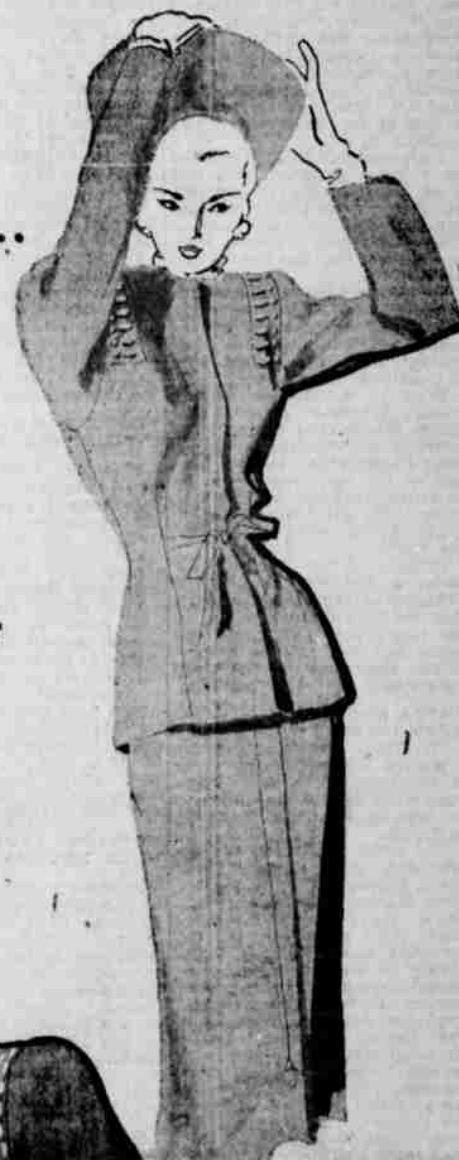
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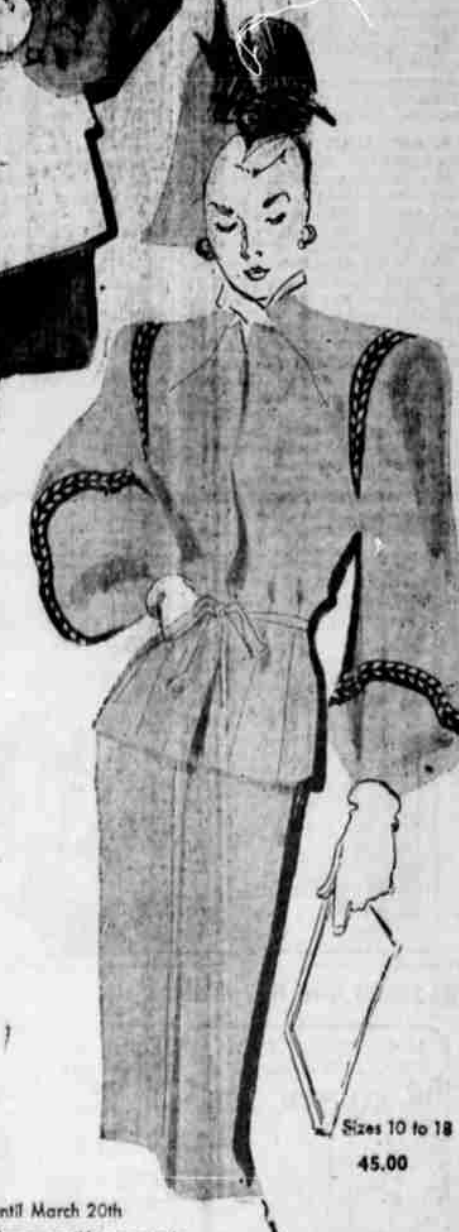
