Durocher Faces Line-Up Of Five L. A. Lawyers

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 31.—(AP)—Baseball Manager Leo Durocher, who seldom squabbles with more than one umpire at a time and then never wins, today found himself lined up against five Los Angeles lawyers including some of the town's best known legal talent.

The panel of barristers was appointed by Superior Judge George A. Dockweiler to advise him whether loquacious Leo, pilot of the Brooklyn Dodgers, should be held in contempt of court for a withering statement the baseball man issued to the press Wednesday in connection with his controverted marriage to Actress Laraine Day.

Durocher, commenting on Dockweiler's summoning Miss Day to show cause whether recent ante-nuptial divorce from J. Ray Hendricks should not be invalidated, called the jurist an "unethical and publicity-conscious servant of the people" and attributed to him a "holier-than-thou" attitude.

Man Jailed After Nude Girl Found

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Jan. 31.—(AP)—The story of a girl who beaten and naked except for one sock, hailed a car in a snowstorm on the highway south of here, led Thursday to the arrest of a 39-year-old Klamath Falls man.

The girl, 17, said a man picked her up as she left Klamath high school, drove over her protests to an isolated road and forced her to disrobe at the point of a knife. The car broke open in a struggle between them, and the girl fled naked to the main highway.

A passing motorist drove her to his home at Dorris, Calif., where his wife gave the girl clothing and took her to a Dor-

ris hospital. California police went to the road and found a car stalled in the snow with signs of a struggle.

The car's discovery led to the arrest of Jack Kyle Perry, on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl. State Police Sgt. Earl Tichenor said Perry admitted the truth of the girl's accusation.

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112th Semi-Annual Statement of

First mortgage investments on northwest homes totaled a new high of \$24,649,171 for Equitable Savings and Loan association. Increased by more than \$7½ million during 1946, mortgage investments now equal 77 per cent of the assets.

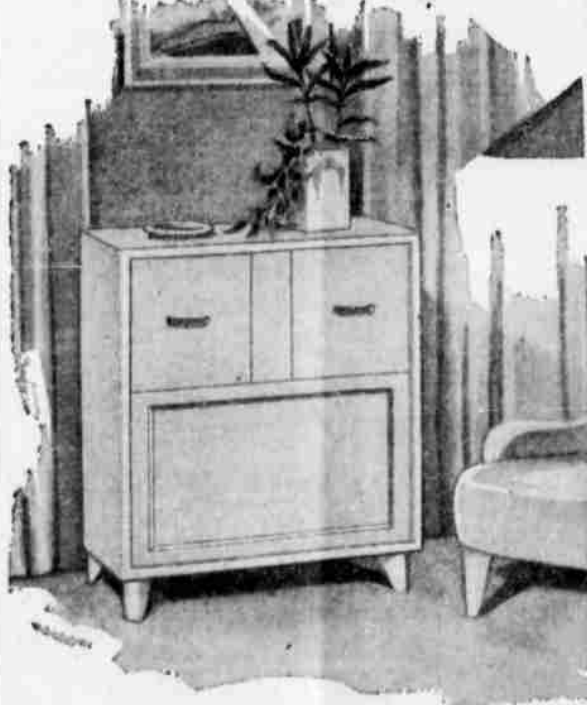
