Rich of Astoria at an impressive candlelight ceremony at St. George's Episcopal Church Sunday, January 12. Father William L. Blaker performed the double ring ceremony in the presence of two hundred and fifty relatives and friends of the couple.

White chrysanthemums decorated the altar, while baskets of daffodils, acacia and greenery completed the decorations. The altar candles were lighted by Bill Sumner.

As the guests assembled Mrs. Homer W. Grow played softly on the organ. Preceding the ceremony Mrs. Grow accompanied Leroy Hiatt, who sang "The Lord's Prayer." Mrs. Grow played the bridal chorus from Lohengrin for the bride party to advance to the altar and at the close of the ceremony, played Mendelssohn's Wedding Recessional.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, was beautiful in a gown of white silk lace over white satin fashioned on princess lines with a short train, long sleeves and high neckline. Tiny white satin buttons were used from the neckline to the waist of the bodice. Her fingertip veil, edged in lace, was held in place with a Mary Stuart cap. MISS DAPHNE HUGHES IS ONE OF THIRTEEN CHOSEN ON HONOR ROLL

Miss Daphne Hughes, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Washington Hughes of Roseburg, has the distinction of being one of thirteen women chosen in a list of thirteen for the Honor Roll of 1946. Miss Hughes is executive secretary of the Youth Consultation Service in the diocese of Newark, N. J., where she supervises this work in seven counties.

Irving P. Johnson is quoted regarding the merit used in making the selection of thirteen names annually in the national honor roll. "The few men whom I know who are cheerfully giving their lives to the service of their fellowmen owe their inspiration for such service to Jesus Christ and to some influence that the Church in some form has had upon their lives. The difficulty is that so few men are willing to abandon their personal selfishness and to put on worship as a garment, and to endure hardship as good soldiers, in order to create an atmosphere in which liberty, righteousness and justice is even a remote possibility."

The 1947 Honor Roll includes: Angus Dun, (Cp) Bishop of Washington; Virginia Gilder-sleeve, for her contribution to education and world peace; Elwood Lindsay Haines, Bishop of Iowa; Daphne Hughes for her excellent job as executive secretary of the Youth Consultation Service in the diocese of Newark; Kenneth Hughes, rector of St. Bartholomew's, Cambridge; Lucy Mason, who, as public relations representative of the CIO in the south, has done much to bring about better understanding between the Church and organized labor; Joseph G. Moore, field worker at Seabury-Western Seminary for going to Columbia, Tenn., at the time of race riots to do what he could in that situation in the name of the church; Owen D. Roberts, first layman to be President of the House of deputies; William Scarlett, Bishop of Missouri; Charles P. Taft, first layman to be elected president of the Federal Council of Churches; Charles F. Winston, on the faculty of the Church Divinity School of the Pacific; David McWilliams, organist and choir director at St. Bartholomew's, New York; and Donald M. Wright, executive director of the Church Society for College work.

At the close of the year the Church magazine Witness presents the names of a number of Church men and women who have served Christ and his Church well during the year, or through the years. Nominations are made by readers; selections are made by the editorial board. The Honor roll started in 1941.

Miss Hughes is very well-known in Roseburg. She attended the Roseburg schools and was graduated from High School in 1927. She was later graduated with high honors from University of Oregon and took further educational work at Bryn Mawr. She has been in her present position for the last several years.

Her corsage was an orchid. Following a week's honeymoon by automobile to San Francisco, the couple returned to Roseburg and are at home to their friends at 527 East Douglas street.

The bride was graduated from Roseburg Senior High School and is employed by the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph Company. The bridegroom served with the U. S. paratroopers in the South Pacific for two years following his being graduated from Astoria High School. He is employed by the Shell Oil Company in Roseburg.
