Education Board Rejects Marine Barracks Terms

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—(AP)—The State Board of Education yesterday unanimously rejected the war assets terms by which the state can acquire the Klamath Marine barracks for use as a vocational school, and decided to carry on further negotiations with the WAA.

The board objected to the provisions that the barracks must be used for 25 years exclusively for educational purposes.

The board will ask the WAA either to reduce the 25-year period and provide exclusive use for education, or to leave it at 25 years and permit the state to use it for other purposes as well as for education.

The board felt that there might not be need for the vocational school in a few years, in which the state might want to use it for some other purpose.

The WAA stipulation provides that if the state took over the barracks, and at any time during the next 25 years the state failed to use it exclusively for education, then the barracks either would revert to the government, or the state could buy it at actual value minus four per cent for each year the plant was used for education.

The board said it would attempt to rush the negotiations to final completion before the end of the legislative session, which would be asked for \$350,000 in state funds to operate the proposed school from now until June 30, 1949.

Mrs. W. M. Kitching Dies in California
Mrs. W. M. Kitching (Ella Harlan Kitching) died in Baldwin Park, Calif., February 1. Whether we like it or not, the trend is along the same line for producing eggs in the future. Mass production is already a fact in many parts of the country now. In Oregon for the most part, we are still producing eggs under the same conditions we did thirty years ago. From twelve to fifteen hundred hens makes heavy work for the whole family.

Yet in part of the U. S. one man is supposed to take complete care twice that many birds and their eggs, and do it in 8-hour days. The answer, of course, is in labor saving equipment and plans. It can't be done if water and feed have to be carried in pails to a dozen different pens, and all the cleaning has to be done with a wheelbarrow, or packed out in a wash tub. And the eggs all carted up onto the back porch.

This isn't as crazy as it sounds. We used to do it, and we know of a lot of places where it is still considered quite proper. That's what the cartoonist has in mind when he says: "Born thirty years too soon."

After seeing one man work 16 hours a day looking after a thousand birds it is a relief to stop at some other place and find the operator taking things easy with twice as many birds. Water all piped to every pen; automatic float valves; feed bins convenient; central egg room; built up litter; litter carriers; cafeteria feeding. All these things save time and effort for the poultryman, and the birds seem to do just as well.

Used to hear a heap about visiting the poultry house often; stir the mash several times a day; to interest the hens in eating it; how well the birds liked the care-taker's company, and would repay his visit with an extra egg every day; and all

that and all that. Well, it may be fun, but we doubt its efficiency.

Get well bred chickens, give them Umpqua feed in amounts they will clean up each day, with enough scratch grain to balance their ration, keep them fairly clean and dry, and they will lay eggs without being burdened with human companionship.

Egg Production Up
