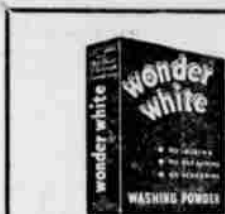

Oregon Hospitals O. K. Nurses Assn. As Bargain Agent

Recognition of the Oregon State Nurses Association as the bargaining agent for registered nurses by the Oregon Association of Hospitals was announced in a directive received by Miss Miriam N. Davis, Roseburg, district president of the nurses' group.

The directive was sent here by Shirley Thompson, state president. The agreement covers 18 districts in the state and is effective immediately, she said.

Recognition by the Oregon Association of Hospitals brings to a local level a movement started last December when the American Nurses' Association designated the Oregon group as bargaining unit for nurses in this area.

With Oregon suffering a need of between 500 and 600 more nurses than at present employed, the association feels that "the only way to fill the ranks with new recruits" is to make working conditions and pay "attractive enough to compete with other types of work," Miss Davis said.

A four-point program has been set up by the O. S. N. A. and approved by the American Nurses' Association. It includes: improvement in working hours and living conditions so that nurses may live normal personal and professional lives; a 44-hour week looking to 40 hours; salaries sufficient to interest women of quality and capacity.

The 18 districts affected by the agreement are: Portland, The Dalles, Salem, Medford, Eugene, Corvallis, Pendleton, Klamath Falls, Astoria, Coos Bay, Roseburg, Baker, The Grande, Hood River, Grants Pass, Coquille and McMinnville.

Indian Chorus to Sing

At Methodist Church

A concert by the Metlakatla Indian Chorus of the Duncan Memorial Church, Annette Island, Alaska, will be presented at the First Methodist Church at 8 o'clock Sunday evening, Feb. 9.

It was announced today by the Rev. W. A. MacArthur, pastor. Of some 700 Tsimshian Indians who live in Metlakatla, a group of 34 have been trained into a great choir and chorus, MacArthur said. They are talented singers, capable of difficult selections, rendered in a beautiful style.

Metlakatla is a progressive, self-governing Indian community on the Southeastern Alaska coast. The people are Tsimshians, originally a very primitive tribe found along the coast of British Columbia. In 1857, the Church of

England sent William Duncan, a young missionary, to Christianize the group.

The community has been entirely self-supporting, with a cannery and sawmill and other business activities. Local government is in the hands of native Metlakatlas. A U. S. government school is maintained. The Christian mission is affiliated with the Methodist Church.

Missioner from Congo Speaks at Kiwanis Meet

Dr. E. R. Moon, missionary-evangelist, was guest speaker of the Roseburg Kiwanis Club Tuesday noon. He told of his big-game hunting in the Congo region, where he built a river boat and was her captain for many years. He also described the customs of the natives and exhibited a few weapons used by them.

Dr. Moon is currently speaking at the First Christian Church in a lecture series.

Fisheries Cooperation Plan Includes Oregon

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Feb. 5.—(AP)—A bill to promote better utilization of Pacific Coast fisheries through the cooperative efforts of California, Oregon and Washington has been introduced here by Assemblyman Vincent Thomas of San Pedro.

He said the bill, to set up a Pacific Marine Fisheries commission, is identical with bills now being introduced in the Oregon each.

and Washington legislatures which were approved by the recent Interstate Cooperation commission in Chicago.

The bill provides for three commissioners to be appointed by the governor for a four-year term. They would survey and recommend a coastwide contract for better utilization of fish, subject to legislative approval.

California would contribute \$11,000 annually to expenses of the commission with Oregon and Washington putting up \$2,000 each.
