Inquest Scheduled Into Killing By K-Falls Officer

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Feb. 5.—(P)—An inquest scheduled to take place in the fatal shooting of Donald Gordon Roberts in an escape attempt at the county courthouse Monday afternoon, was requested by the peace officer who fired the pistol shot which killed the fleeing prisoner.

Roberts was shot by Deputy Sheriff Marion Barnes. As an aftermath to the shooting, Sheriff Lloyd Low yesterday made a statement upholding the deputy's action, while Claude Shoup, brother-in-law of Roberts, issued a statement to the press critical of the sheriff's office and claiming that consideration of Roberts' mental condition would have prevented the occurrence.

Shoup's statement, handed to a local newspaper, said that Roberts had been in jail for three months and the sheriff's office should have known Donald's mental condition and attitude toward life and taken proper precaution to prevent the tragedy that happened.

Shoup said that when a sanity hearing was given Roberts, members of the family were not given enough time to present their witnesses.

Sheriff Low said that if Barnes had not acted as he did, he would be of no value as an officer for the protection of law-abiding citizens.

Had Criminal Record
Police Officer Roberts was arrested here last October on a charge of taking a Bend-Portland freight Company truck.

When taken into Justice court for arraignment, he attracted attention by lying down and going to sleep on the courtroom floor. Roberts was given a sanity hearing later and found sane.

His police record includes a year probation for larceny here in 1940 and a three-year sentence from Klamath Falls in 1943 for robbery.

Deputy Sheriff Barnes is an old time peace officer. He was at one time a state game law enforcement officer, and later served as sergeant of the state police. He spent several years farming, and was named deputy recently by Sheriff Lloyd Low.

French Children Clothed At Average of \$7 Each

PORTLAND, Feb. 5.—(P)—Five thousand French children were clothed at an average cost of \$7 each, Mme. Suzanne Van Acker of New York and Paris told a luncheon group here.

The money, supplied by donations to an organization set up for the purpose, was used to buy material at wholesale. The garments were cut by volunteer workers in buildings supplied rent free, and only shoes and older children's coats were bought ready made, she said.

Douglas Electric Co-Op Anticipates Year of Expansion

Five hundred additional connections to the rural lines of the Douglas Electric Cooperative is the goal for the coming year, it was stated at the cooperative's annual meeting Monday by Harold Backen, manager.

Backen presented a comprehensive report of the Douglas Electric Cooperative's past, present, and future plans. The ultimate system, he said, will include about 700 miles of line serving approximately 2,600 consumers of electric energy.

Also a speaker was W. E. Trammershansen of the Bonneville Power Administration, who designed the Brockway substation in 1938. He was then with the Rural Electrification Administration.

Trammershansen told of Bonneville's plans to build additional facilities for serving Northern Douglas County. At present there is one Bonneville power line from Salem to Eugene, to Drain. The line is tapped for power along the entire route.

The Bonneville Administration has plans for building a second line to Eugene and an extension to Reedsport and Coos Bay. The additional facilities depend upon Congressional approval of BPA budget requests.

Only immediate relief for the power load is seen in the installation of a larger transformer and new regulator at Drain next spring, Trammershansen said.

Consumption Tops Estimate

New installations must be able to accommodate anticipated future growth in the power system. Power consumption in this locality has far exceeded original estimates he made in 1938, Trammershansen said.

He also pointed out that unless new generators are installed at Grand Coulee Dam and the Detroit and McNary Dams, Oregon and Washington will continue to have a "power" shortage. The shortage is not in the potential power of rivers and waterfalls, he said, but in generation and transmission facilities.

Also a speaker at yesterday's meeting was Glenn Sawyer of the Rural Electrification Administration.

New directors elected were: Jack Parrott, District 1; Neal Meyer, District 2; Jay Young, District 3; and Harry Norton, District 7.

Prizes were awarded W. Castor, Oakland; A. R. McDonald, Elkton; Mrs. Earl Ollivant, Eugene; Holcomb, and Ross M. Miller. More than 100 members were in attendance at the meeting, held at the Knights of Pythias hall.

The annual report showed 401 miles of line energized in 1946; 1,418 connected members; 405,496 kilowatt hours purchased; 359,731 kilowatt hours sold; an 11.2

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per cent line loss; peak demands of 284 kilowatts at the Brockway substation, 264 at Oakland, 792 at Drain, 214.4 at Smith River. Average use per member was 254 kilowatt hours.

Total billing for the year was \$8,452.69. Average bill per member was \$593. Operating revenue per mile was \$21.08.
