A beautiful legend is connected with the life of the great artist Michelangelo. Once while working on a great painting, he began to feel incompetent to finish it. He realized its imperfections but he did not seem able to correct them. Growing discouraged he fell asleep before the unfinished canvas. While he slept an angel came down and went over to the canvas, touching it into rare beauty and completeness. Finally the artist awoke with a sense of shame that he had neglected his work for sleep. Still discouraged he took the brush, determined to overcome the faults and finish the picture. But as he lifted his eyes, his soul was thrilled to see that the painting was finished, and that it was painted, far fairer than any picture of his making. What a comfort that legend brings to us. How often we have tried to be like the Master, tried and failed. But when we need it most, the Master comes and through the holy spirit silently and beautifully completes the work in us and through us. "Not by might, nor by power, but by My spirit saith the Lord of hosts." Amen.

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Exams Slated for Civil Service Jobs

Federal Civil Service examinations will be given for the permanent probational appointment to the position of clerk, it was announced today by Postmaster L. L. Wimberly, civic service representative in Roseburg.

Persons who desire permanent positions will have an opportunity to file for a civil service examination leading to a probational appointment with permanent classified civil service status in this position in various Federal Government agencies in the states of Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington.

The entrance salary for this position ranges from \$1,756 to \$2,394 a year.

Applicants for this examination will be required to take a written test.

They must be between the ages of 18 and 62, except that age limits may be waived for veterans and under certain conditions for war service indefinite employees.

Further information on this examination and the necessary application form for applying may be obtained from the secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, at any first or second class post office or from the director, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service Region, Room 4, Central Building, Seattle 4, Washington. Applications must be received at the office of the director, Eleventh U. S. Civil Service Region, Room 457, Central Building, Seattle 4, Washington, not later than February 13, 1947.

Amendments to open competitive examinations were also announced for probational appointment to the positions of telephone operator, CAF-1 through CAF-3, \$1,756 to \$2,168 a year, and telephone supervisor, CAF-4 through CAF-6, \$2,394 to \$3,021 a year. The Civil Service Commission

announced the amendment of announcement No. 11-12 for the above positions to extend the date for receipt of applications to February 26, 1947, because of insufficient applications.
