After the meeting cake and coffee were served by Mildred Chapman and Orville French.

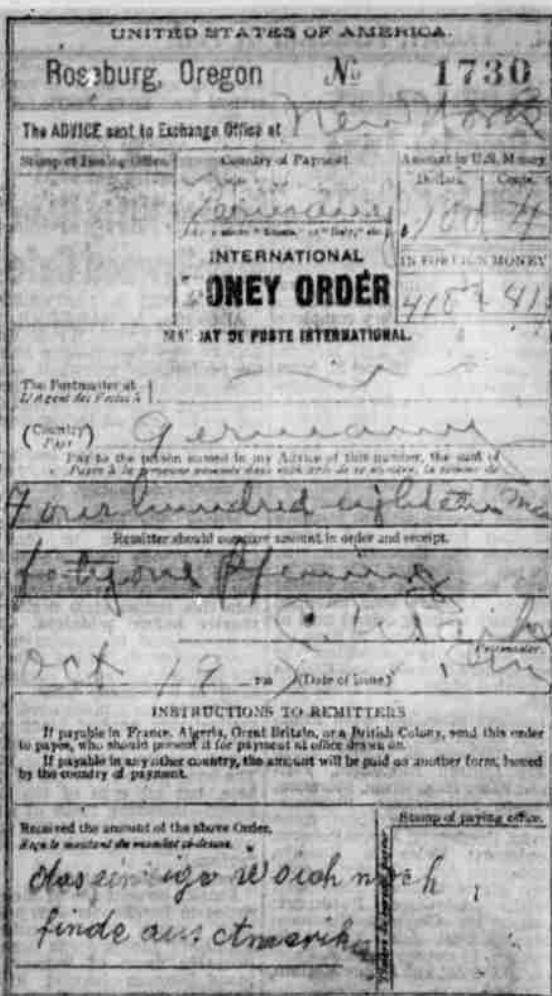
The Oakland chapter meets the second and fourth Thursdays of each month and all visiting members are welcome.

Roseburg Money Order of 1907 Returns From Germany

Charles Doerner of Roseburg received this postal money order from a cousin in Germany this week. It was issued in Roseburg 40 years ago. Either his father or grandfather had sent it to relatives. For \$100 (or 418 marks, 41 pfennig), Doerner is wondering if he can obtain reimbursement on the money order. Local postal employees said he must send it to Washington, D. C.

The letter to Doerner enclosing the money order contained no word of explanation except this translated notation on the order itself:

"This is the only thing we can find left from America."

Doerner said he believed either his father, John Doerner, or grandfather, George Doerner, had purchased the money order from C. W. Parks, then postmaster in Roseburg, to send to relatives in Germany. George Doerner emigrated from Germany in 1894 and returned about 1907.

Navy Display Unit In Roseburg Draws Many Spectators

More than 1000 persons have visited the two mobile display units of the 19th Naval District in Roseburg since its opening last Monday. Lieutenant Commander Walt Lunsford said today. Monday brought the largest throng of spectators yet experienced since the unit's tour of Oregon began and a record is expected to be reached on Saturday, the unit's last day in Roseburg before moving to Medford.

Working in connection with Roseburg's newly organized Naval Reserve Unit, under the direction of Ensign David Hill, the unit, located on Oak street, between Jackson and Main, features displays of Navy radar in action, a 12-foot lucite model of the Commencement Bay type CVE carrier-105 class, numerous Japanese weapons and military and naval outfits, and other equipment of the Navy.

Climate Given Praise "We are pulling several strings through headquarters," Commander Lunsford said Thursday. "In order to get the Roseburg Naval Reserve company the best of electronic equipment, I don't believe enough credit can be given Dave Hill for his hard-earned time and work put in in backing this organization."

"Also everyone of our crew," Lunsford added, "is grateful to the residents of Roseburg for the all-out hospitality extended us during our visit here. Roseburg has by far the best climate of any city we've thus far visited and as far as we are concerned, it is unsurpassed."

Call to Veterans Commenting in the interest of efforts being made to recruit local men in the local Naval Reserve company, Lunsford said:

While the Navy's organized program as a whole is of the most vital interest to the entire country, it has special significance for naval veterans.

"In the first place it means a continuance of the veterans' patriotic wartime contribution. We cannot preserve our seapower, so urgently needed to protect our nation, unless we maintain a pool of trained manpower."

The Navy must have an adequate force of reservists, not only to be available for duty in case of attack, but also to pass on their skills to the 17- and 18-year-olds, who have just been made eligible to join the reserve.

Personal Benefits Offered "There are also many personal benefits to be derived from service in the organized reserve, not only from the many social advantages accruing to membership in the reserve, but the reservists will receive technical training which could not be duplicated anywhere else in the world."

"Moreover the reservist has an opportunity to retain his former rate in case he should be called to active duty, and can continue to advance in rating."

"Veterans should remember that this is strictly a voluntary service," Lunsford concluded.

"They cannot be called to active duty except at their own request or by presidential proclamation, which would be issued only in case of emergency. And, if they do not find reserve duty to their liking, they can always terminate their service."

Merit Certificates to Be Given School Patrol

Members of the Roseburg Junior Safety Patrol will receive certificates of merit with city officials' signatures upon graduation from Junior High School, Douglas M. Tudor, police officer in charge of the safety division announced today.

Sponsored by the Roseburg Lions Club, and the city police department, the patrol division, numbering 54 students at Fullerton, Rose and St. Joseph grade schools and Junior High, have

voluntarily rendered their services as traffic directors for pupils' safety at crossing for the past year.

Certificates to be presented to members of the patrol upon graduation from the eighth grade are given for "honest and faithful service rendered to the student's city and schools," stating thereon the length of time the members served with the patrol and signed by the city's mayor, chief of police, school superintendent and principal, and the school's student safety patrol captain.
