OSC Hoopsters Tip Oregon, 71-57

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 10.—(AP)—The Oregon State Beavers were playing precision basketball here Saturday night as they picked their spots for field shooting to strip the University of Oregon Ducks, 71-57, for the third OSC victory in as many "civil war" meetings this season.

Most of their shooting was lay-in shots from right under or nearby after swift plays.

Coach Slats Bill's players sank 26 field goals in 49 tosses while Oregon collected 18 goals from a total of 76 tries. On the foul line, OSC connected with 19 tosses, while Oregon counted 21. OSC missed 11 and Oregon muffed 13.

During the first half, the Staters were dead-eye-Dicks from the foul line. Hochy put in four of his four shots; Beck three in four and Crandall five. The average helped widen the gap OSC snatched in the opening minutes.

After the halftime 39-28 tally, the Beavers moved in eight minutes to a 20 point lead at 54-34. Later they stretched it to 23 points at 59-36 before Oregon rallied briefly to cut the final margin to 14 points.

The tight man-to-man defense played by Oregon State held down the Oregon shooting average, particularly the several times Oregon fought savagely to rally.

SEATTLE, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The winless Idaho Vandals, hapless defending titlists in the northern division coast conference basketball race, undertake the arduous four-game Oregon road tour this week but the eyes of conference fans will be on a Friday-Saturday series between the off-and-on University of Washington Huskies and Coach Jack Fri's perennial-challenging Washington State Cougars in Seattle.

For the Cougars, who have the same number of wins but two more losses than the front-running Oregon State Beavers, the series will either send their hopes soaring or grand them to dust.

Washington State must win both games in order to remain in a challenging position when Oregon State invades the Pullman campus Feb. 24 and 25. A loss in either contest would wipe out all but the last vestige of even a mathematical chance that the Beavers will be headed off in their pennant race.

The two leaders kept pace over the weekend with Oregon State swamping Oregon, 71-57, and Washington State trouncing Idaho, 51-39.

The Idaho road tour takes them against Oregon State Tuesday and Wednesday and against Oregon Friday and Saturday.

Military Training Issue Revived by Marshall's Talk

WASHINGTON, Feb. 10.—(AP)—Congressional leaders showed new reluctance today to write off universal training as a dead issue.

While every sign still points to the toughest kind of fight ahead, too men on both sides of Capitol Hill indicated privately that the outlook may change.

They cite two factors: First, the tremendous personal popularity in Congress of Secretary of State Marshall, and second, possible international developments not now foreseen.

Marshall in his first news conference as a cabinet officer last week listed universal military training as a requirement if this country is to have any real and positive military power to back up its foreign policy.

On the surface his declaration made no deep impression on those who have been outspoken against any plan for peacetime conscription.

A sample check of six senators—three from each major party—disclosed only one, Chairman Gurney (R. S. D.), of the Armed Services Committee, squarely behind the universal training plan. Others either were flatly opposed or suggested compromises that would not interfere with education or jobs of young men.

An earlier check among the House Armed Services Committee indicated similar strong opposition to any compulsory peacetime training.

But leaders who a few weeks ago tended to dismiss the idea as lacking any real chance plainly are adopting a "let's wait and see" attitude.

Boy Gangs Battle, Results Tragic

NEW YORK, Feb. 10.—(AP)—One youth was dead, two were in jail charged with homicide, another was held on a charge of felonious assault, and still another was in the hospital today as a result of a flareup of violence among boyhood gangs over the week end.

Thomas Soto, 14, and Candido Noriega, 13, were held pending a further hearing tomorrow in the death of Earl Keller, 16, a Negro.

Police said that Soto and Noriega, members of "The Rockets," each fired a shot with a gang-owned .22 rifle from an apartment roof to frighten members of a rival gang, "The Royals," Saturday afternoon. Keller, a bystander yelled "I'm shot" and died instantly.

Later, police said, Frank Torres, 17, a friend of Keller, gathered some friends and attacked Soto's brothers, Louis, 17, and Richard, 19.

Louis is in a hospital suffering from a stab wound in the chest. Richard was struck on the head with a hatchet and was given first aid, police said.

Torres was held under \$3,000 bail pending examination on a charge of felonious assault.

At a hearing yesterday in youth court of Bronx Police Court, Thomas Soto and Noriega told the court the 19 members of "The Rockets" had chipped in a total of \$20.45 to buy the .22 rifle, which they kept hanging by a wire inside a chimney.
