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Reedsport Men Lose Clams In River Accident

REEDSPORT—Bemoaning their loss of the "finest mess of clams ever dug on the Umpqua sands," Bill Lloyd, local barber, and John Waggoner were recovering this week from a thorough dunking in the river.

Lloyd and Waggoner were returning from their clamming expedition Saturday morning. They were in a small skiff powered with a small motor. As they made port at the county dock, they shut off the motor too soon and could not make the dock.

Lloyd stood up to grab an oar in order to paddle in. At the same time, Waggoner started to crank the engine. Both men moved at the same time to the same side of the frail skiff. As a result, the skiff capsized, throwing the men, clams, shovels and all into the water.

Waggoner made the dock first. Lloyd attempted to overturn the skiff. Then, unsuccessful, he started to swim ashore. Both men wore heavy hip rubber boots and rubberized storm coats and hats as well as wool clothing.

Waggoner, who has a heart ailment, was just able to pull himself ashore and lay exhausted, unable to give Lloyd any assistance. But after a hard struggle, Lloyd made a landing near the dock, clinging to a rope hanging from a moored boat.

After resting, he was able to pull himself to shore by hanging on the gunwales of anchored boats.

Both men regret the loss of their clams more than their cold plunge into the Umpqua, they said.

Seven Portland Cops Sued by Cafe Owner

PORTLAND, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Conrad A. Johnson, a Portland cafe owner, has sued eight policemen for \$70,000 damages, declaring they disrupted his business because of a personal grudge against him.

Johnson asserted that for three days in September the men drove police cars over the sidewalk before his cafe, jostled patrons, and told customers "to stay out of the joint."

Embezzler Has Hard Time Convincing Court of Guilt

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—(AP)—Assistant Bank Cashier Florence Edler Volkner embezzled \$10,000—but had a difficult time proving it.

Her story was revealed in Federal Judge Louis E. Goodman's court where she pleaded guilty yesterday to misapplying bank funds and causing false entries. Judge Goodman from the bench declared it was the most unusual

embezzlement case in his experience.

He said Mrs. Volkner confessed before her peculations were discovered but that she was so trusted it took her a week to convince Bank of America officials she was telling the truth.

Furthermore, said the judge, she invested the money well and turned back to the bank not only the \$10,000 but also \$5,000 worth of real estate and securities. Judge Goodman, who described Mrs. Volkner as "a good and even a devoted mother," said she was entitled to the assets in excess of the \$10,000, and granted her two years probation.

Diverse Religions Among OSC Student Preferences

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Students here have listed 35 different religious preferences on their registration cards in addition to those who merely marked down "protestant," "community church," "free thinker" and two who recorded themselves as "atheist." As the statement is not compulsory 1541 marked "no preference" and about 2000 left the space blank.

Methodist preference lead all others with 1132, closely followed by Presbyterians with 1101. Next largest group was Catholic with 567, followed by Episcopal, 499; protestant, 485; Baptist, 392; Christian, 346; Lutheran, 343; Congregational, 202; Mormon, 67; Evangelical United Brethren, 61; and Jewish, 22.

Reflecting the large number of foreign students are the preferences, Coptic Church of Egypt, Greek Orthodox and Islam.
