"I was chagrined," said Stockman, "at Mr. Raver and his staff's lack of frankness and apparent unwillingness to help the committee in its work of determining just how much money Bonneville should receive."

"Being the only western member on the subcommittee and anxious that the Bonneville administration get all the money it needed, I was disappointed that the witnesses did not prove more cooperative. With all other members being from the east, at least the paid help of the government should have helped me in presenting a good case."

"I expect and intend to see that these paid government employees cooperate with me in presenting the west's needs to our committee in a full and frank manner."

American Industry. At Charleston, Taft told a Lincoln Day audience that while he is opposed to a return to congressional tariff-making with its "inevitable logrolling," the present "reciprocal program" permits the president to establish

almost complete free trade." Other Leaders Speak Out At St. Paul, GOP Chairman Carroll Reese said the Republicans are going to right things after "the greatest economic spree of all history for the past 15 years."

Senator Saltonstall of Massachusetts told a Los Angeles audience that he would support universal military training "if it is necessary and advisable for future security."

At Louisville, Ky., Saltonstall's Massachusetts colleague, Senator Lodge, called for a "complete overhauling of the government in January, 1949."

At Huntington, W. Va., Senator Martin (Pa.), who is talked of as a possible candidate for first or second place on the 1948 GOP national ticket, criticized what he called President Truman's "hog fat" budget and promised the Republicans would cut it.

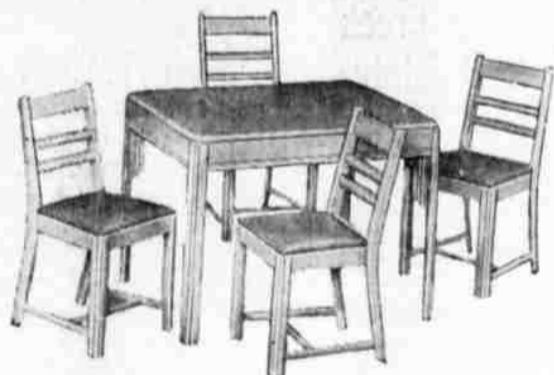
