

Sen. Baldwin Warns GOP Against Radical Changes

PORTLAND, Feb. 13.—(P)—A Republican-sponsored Lincoln Day banquet assembly heard Sen. Raymond E. Baldwin (R-Conn.) warn the party last night that any radical changes in government might return their party to "the lonely role of minority."

Baldwin recommended a middle-of-the-road labor policy in new legislation but said laws

were needed to avoid crippling strikes in vital industries.

The three-time governor of Connecticut said repeal of the labor legislation of the past 15 years would destroy the labor gains of a half century.

Support of the UN was cited as the principal guarantee that nations of opposing political beliefs could work and live at peace.

Legislative Work Covers Big Batch Of Varied Issues

Following are proceedings of the Oregon legislature omitted from previous reports in the News-Review because of lack of space:

The House, mindful of recent hotel fire disasters over the nation, gave unanimous approval to a bill to require enclosure of all unprotected openings in all buildings used for sleeping purposes, but excluding private dwellings.

The bill, which now goes to the Senate, would give owners of such buildings three years to comply. It would apply to open stairways, elevators, dumbwaiters, chutes, light shafts and other openings.

The Senate Judiciary Committee recommended passage of bills to increase salaries of Supreme Court judges from \$7,500 to \$10,000 a year, and Circuit Judges from \$6,000 to \$8,000.

Access Bill at Issue

The legislative highway committees heard representatives of the Portland, Eugene and Salem Chambers of Commerce endorse the thoroughway bill, which would permit the State Highway Commission to build roads with limited access, thus curbing commercial development along highways.

Sen. McKay, Salem, chairman of the Senate Roads and Highways Committee, said he has received many protests against the bill, but that he is convinced there's a lot of support for it.

McKay said thoroughways are needed to make highways safer.

A bill to establish a six-man commission to buy surplus federal property for the state, counties and cities was submitted to the Ways and Means Committee by Sen. Patterson, Portland. The bill would appropriate \$165,000, to pay expenses of agents who would be located in cities where the property is offered for sale.

Game, Fish Bills Passed

Yesterday was "game day" in the House, which passed six bills to increase non-resident hunting licenses from \$15 to \$25, non-resident fishing licenses from \$5 to \$10, let the Game Commission make regulations for tagging fish and game held in storage lockers, provide for tagging of Elk, increasing pay of fish commissioners from \$5 to \$10 a day,

reducing the bag limit on smelt from 50 to 25 pounds a day, and prohibiting transfer of commercial fishing licenses.

All of these bills go to the Senate.

The Senate passed and sent to the House bills to let the State Board of Health accept federal aid for cancer research, and to repeal the law which requires that a man convicted of a second felony must be sentenced to the maximum term permitted by law.

Research Fund Studied

Snellstrom, Eugene, told the Joint Ways and Means Committee that the budget for the Oregon Forest Products Research Laboratory at Corvallis should not have been cut to \$100,000, or \$69,266 less than requested.

Committee members said that if the proposed 20 cents a thousand timber severance tax is passed, the laboratory would get plenty of money.

But, they said, if the tax is defeated, then the Ways and Means Committee would appropriate more than the \$100,000.

The House completed legislative action on a resolution for a five-man committee to investigate possible use of the hospital at Camp White, near Medford, as a state mental hospital.

House members appointed to the committee are Dr. F. H. Damsch, Portland; Anna M. Ellis, Garibaldi; and O. H. Bengston, Medford.

Rep. Earl Hill, Cushman, a member of the State Fish Commission, got unanimous consent from the House to be permitted to abstain from voting on a bill which would raise salaries of fish commissioners from \$5 to \$10 a day.

Hill explained there is a suit pending in Supreme Court contesting his right to serve both on the commission and in the legislature.

Highway Poles At Issue

The Senate Roads and Highways Committee heard arguments on the state highway commission's bill to compel utilities to use poles jointly on highways, and to force power companies to prevent radio interference in their lines.

Most of the testimony was on the radio feature, with highway commission representatives asserting any automobile owner with a radio in his car has a right to have clear reception, which often is subject to interference by power lines.

Power company representatives said they have done much work to minimize radio interference, but that most of the trouble comes from home and farm appliances. One witness said that only 23.6 per cent of his company's reported cases of radio interference came from line disturbances.

Giving or receiving bribes in connection with athletic events would be subject to a maximum penalty of \$5,000 fine and five years in prison under a bill introduced by Sen. Lynch, Portland.

Withholding Tax Favored

The senate assessment and taxation committee voted to introduce a bill providing for a one per cent withholding tax on incomes.

State Tax Commissioner Fisher said the bill would prevent

transients and other persons from leaving the state without paying their income taxes. If the withholding tax is not enough to cover the total income tax, then the difference would be due April 15.

Several persons, including representatives of the Oregon Automobile Dealers Association, protested to the committee against the proposed constitutional amendment to let the state and counties levy taxes on automobiles for general purposes. The witnesses said the proposal would pave the way for more diversion of road funds.

Passage of house bills to let the governor call upon city fire departments to help in confining fires in other cities and to permit the state fire marshal to regulate exits of two-story rooming houses was recommended by a committee. The fire marshal already has this authority for larger buildings.

School Fund Via Income Tax

The house legislation and rules committee voted to introduce a bill by Rep. French, Moro, to amend the basic school law, which was enacted by the voters last November.

The bill would make the basic school fund of \$16,000,000 a year wholly dependent upon income tax revenues, eliminating property taxes for that purpose. Whereas the existing law makes mandatory a state contribution of \$50 per child, French's new bill makes the \$50 only a maximum.

At the same time, French an-

nounced he has drafted a bill for distribution of the basic school fund, which would considerably change the formula as worked out by house bill 9. The new proposal is expected to be introduced in the senate.

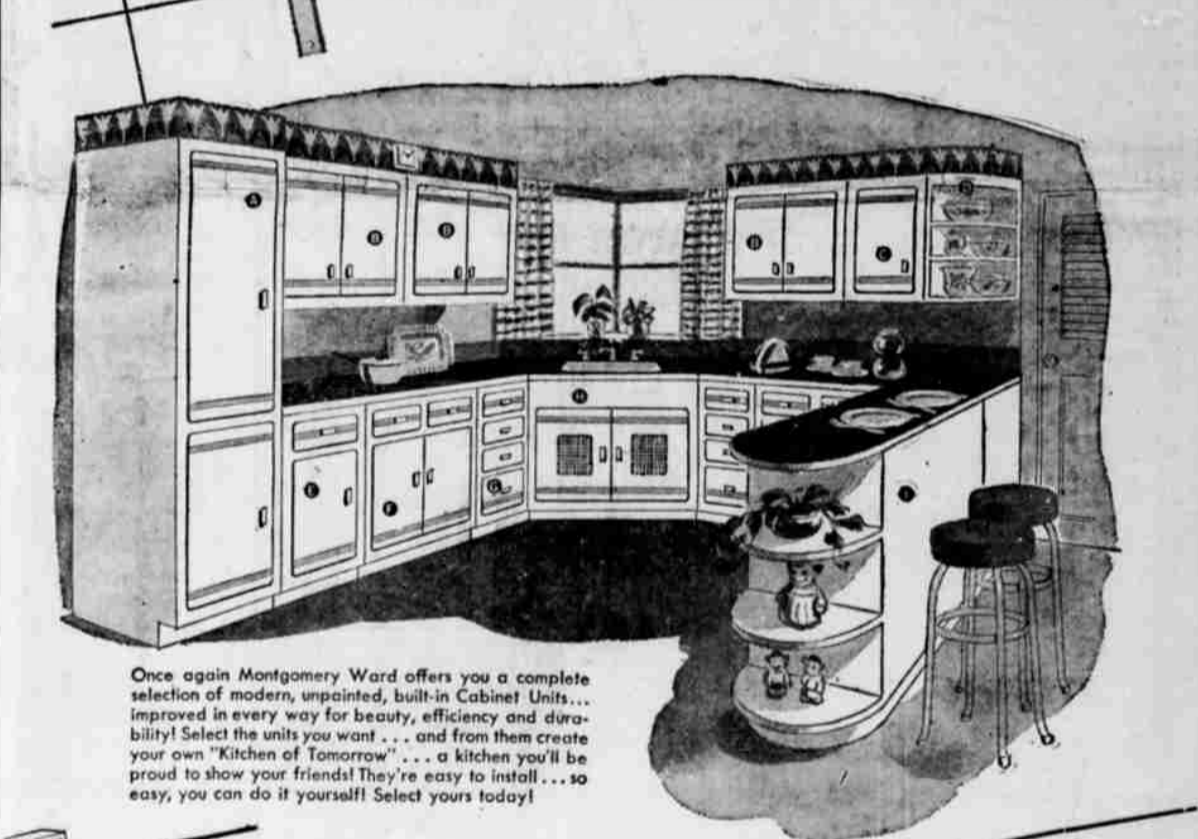
