Security Coverage for Self-Employed Proposed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Rep. Carl Albert (R-Nebr.) said today he will propose amendment of the Social Security act to cover self-employed professional people, business owners and employees of state and local governments.

"It is estimated that there are about nine million self-employed people in the United States," Curtis said. "This group, by making their own jobs, lessen the threat of unemployment in the nation."

"Under my proposal, the benefits of Social Security would be extended to them on a voluntary basis."

Centennial Firm to Replace Burned Mill

TACOMA, Feb. 12.—(AP)—Directors of the Centennial Flour Mills Company have authorized plans to build a large new modern mill here to replace the one which burned last month. Moritz Mibura, president, announced. Rebuilding will begin as soon as a new site can be decided upon, he said.

The new mill will provide for flour production at the rate of 8,000 sacks or more per day and will include provision for 1,000,000 bushels of grain storage.

Lincoln's 3-Page Autobiography is Given to Public

WASHINGTON, Feb. 12.—(AP)—The three-page autobiography that helped make Abraham Lincoln a president was given yesterday to the Library of Congress.

The Rev. Robert Dale Richardson, of Medford, Mass., presented the hastily scribbled lines in which Lincoln recorded tersely, humorously, the first 50 years of his life.

Written in 1859, it winds up with: "If any personal description of me is thought desirable, it may be said, I am in height, six feet, four inches, nearly; lean in flesh, weighing, on an average, one hundred and eighty pounds; dark complexion with coarse black hair; and grey eyes—no other marks or brands recollected."

A year later Lincoln was elected president.

Giving the manuscript to Dr. Luther Evans, librarian of Congress, the Rev. Mr. Richardson said it is "the cornerstone of all Lincoln biographies."

All the thousands of books on Lincoln, he said, are based on these three short pages.

Dr. Evans placed the bound sheets of foolscap in a showcase near other Lincoln documents. "Banking the donor for the 'unique and highly valuable manuscript,'" he recalled that "Carl Sandburg once described it as 'a self-portrait as good as Rembrandt.'"

The Rev. Mr. Richardson is the great grandson of Jesse W. Fell who persuaded Lincoln to write the autobiography.
