Local Option Bill Given 'No' at Salem

public power question. The defeat of the public power proponents indicated they won't have any success in getting the people's utility district law liberalized so as to permit districts to issue revenue bonds without vote of the districts' residents.

Passage of the power bill by the House yesterday was sought by Baker, Grant and Malheur Counties, whose representatives said the bill would enable the Idaho Power Company to build a \$10,000,000 dam on the Snake River to relieve a critical power shortage. Opponents charged the bill would permit private power companies to take over power rights which belong to the people.

Representatives of Oregon counties told the House Assessment and Taxation Committee that they oppose the State Tax Study Commission's proposal to repeal the personal property tax and substitute for it the business tax of 1 of 1 per cent on gross income.

Action on Other Bills—The House approved and sent to the Senate a bill to make counties care for insane persons in hospitals pending their commitment to the state hospital, while the Senate sent to the House a bill to require the governor to call special elections to fill Congressional vacancies.

The Senate defeated a House bill to increase the pay of election judges and clerks from \$4 a day to \$1 an hour.

The House voted, 54 to 6, to kill a bill to prevent persons on relief and old age pension recipients from obtaining liquor permits.

Governor Snell signed into law bills to make it illegal to borrow a fishing or hunting license, and to make motor vehicle driver licenses expire on the birthday of the licensee.

The House Military and Veterans Affairs Committee voted to introduce a resolution asking

Congress to make a 50 per cent increase in allowances for the on-the-job training program for veterans.

The House approved and sent to the Senate measures to provide a 10 per cent increase in nurserymen's license fees to fight plant diseases and insects, give the state fire marshal power over exits of two-story rooming houses, exempt domestic insurance companies from paying the state 2 per cent tax on premiums, and to continue the interim committee on juvenile delinquency.

The Senate sent to the House a bill to allow state officials to make deductions from employees' salaries to pay for group life insurance.

The House Education Committee announced it would meet next Tuesday at 7 P. M. in an attempt to send House Bill 9, which would apportion the \$16,000,000 basic school support fund, to the House floor for a vote.
