College Group to Visit Roseburg

Independent Oregon colleges are sending representatives on a tour of the state this week to bring high school seniors up to date on postwar college conditions. The delegation will reach Roseburg Thursday.

Those making the trip are Dr. M. O. Skarston, Pacific University, head of the delegation; Dr. Charles W. Howard, Lewis and Clark College; Harold B. Jory, Willamette University; A. F. Bitter, Reed College; Cliff Elliott, Linfield College; G. W. Swambeck, Multnomah College, and the Rev. John J. Hooyboer, University of Portland.

The delegation has information about current difficulties of registration, entrance examinations, and proper class scheduling, and many other details of post-war college life.

High School students are first addressed in general assembly, where they are given general information. Representatives will then meet with students interested in colleges.

Feel Soil to Tell Time for Planting
Experienced gardeners learn much from feeling the soil. Most important of all the conditions that can be tested by getting your hands in the dirt, is the moisture content.

For spading, cultivating, and seed sowing, soil which is neither too wet nor too dry is best. Wet soil should never be worked, and heavy soil when dry can be as hard as a brick; while the same soil with the right degree of moisture may be as easy to work as a sandy loam.

If wet soil is spaded, it usually forms hard clods which may hold together all season to do harm in many ways. Seed should not be sown, or plants set out, in wet soil. You should not even walk on it, until it dries out sufficiently.

The most reliable test is simple one—call it the mud-pie test. Pick up a handful of soil and pat it between your palms as you used to do in childhood; if it holds together and makes a nice mud-pie, then it is too wet. There is a point between the two extremes of too wet, and too dry when a handful of soil, patted between the palms, will crumble. It is not dry, but slightly moist, yet not wet enough to hold together in a mud-pie. At this point, even clay can be spaded easily, and will break up without forming clods. When the test indicates that this favorable condition prevails, do not delay, otherwise the soil may dry out unduly, and compel you to wait for heavy rains to restore the right degree of moisture.
