Wheat Scramble On as Price Soars To 26-Year High

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—(AP)—Wheat was a precious article today as it scrambled to obtain supplies in the nation's markets to fill their demands for flour from bakers and government buying agencies.

Following an unusually sharp advance over the past four weeks, wheat was selling at the highest price since 1920 in most markets. Flour was advancing with wheat and there was some speculation that bread prices might be hiked. In the opinion of grain experts, was the government buying of wheat and flour for export to food deficit areas abroad.

C. M. Galvin of James E. Bennett and Company, grain firm, said, "I think the fundamental reason for the sharp advance is the draining of our supplies to furnish foreign governments with wheat and flour."

"About a month ago the Commodity Credit Corporation obtained around 25,000,000 bushels of wheat in one day. Much of the wheat now arriving at terminals is being applied on these government contracts and there isn't much other wheat available."

A similar position was taken by E. A. Boerner of Harris, Upham and Company, who said the "floating supply" of wheat had been drained and "there just isn't any surplus at terminal markets."

Other Explanations
"Over the past several months," Boerner added, "chain bakers and others have been backing away from the flour market, expecting prices to come down in line with widespread predictions of a price recession. Now their flour stocks are exhausted and they've jumped back into the market."

A spokesman for General Mills, the nation's largest milling company, said the wheat shortage did not compare with a year ago when bread disappeared from bakery shelves and there was a short-lived bread "famine."

"Our major difficulty is getting box cars to move flour," he said. "Now and then one of our mills has to shut down for a day or two, but it's mainly a box car shortage and not a wheat famine."

Flour prices were raised 10 to 15 cents a hundred pound sack at Minneapolis yesterday. Hermann Steen, secretary of the Millers National Federation, said flour quotations are tied in with wheat and naturally move up or down with the grain.

sary for the general welfare, safety, and health of the people, he said.

Legislative Spur Advised
Posing the question: "Zoning restricts the use of property; where is the line between restriction and condemnation?" Fort said it has been only 21 years since establishment of the right by Supreme Court decision, for

cities to restrict the use of property. "How far can you restrict without having to condemn? That is the fundamental issue," he declared.

Fort concluded his discussion by showing maps of the Eugene-Springfield area, where there is an acute zoning problem resulting from increased populations in the suburbs of the two cities.

He urged that Roseburg business men write to their legislators requesting immediate action on a rural zoning bill now up for consideration, stating:

"It is an absolute necessity for Roseburg to be able to exercise control over the areas immediately outside the city, to make these areas fit the pattern of development."

Minimum Teachers Pay Plan Accepted

Acceptance by the school board last night of the \$2,400 minimum salary schedule for teachers was announced by Superintendent of Schools Paul S. Elliott.

Increases set by the new schedule are predicated on the school district's receiving its "fair share" from the Basic School Support Fund and the passage of a special levy exceeding the 6 per cent limitation, Elliott said.

The board's approval of the salary schedule followed the appearance of the faculty salary committee, which presented the schedule which had been adopted a few weeks ago by classroom teachers of the OEA.

The increases are in line with the general trend of teachers' salaries throughout the state, Elliott said. The board voted the \$2,400 minimum for certified teachers with three-year normal school training, with a \$60 increment increase for satisfactory service over a period of 15 years.

Recommendations made by the committee for tenure and yearly increments were accepted by the board with reservations, which will be worked out "beneficially" to both the faculty and school board, Elliott said.
