chairman of the Central Lincoln PUD's board of directors, said the district's population has doubled in the past three years, making it difficult to serve Florence and Reedsport. Reedsport Plaint Voiced

certificates of public convenience and necessity would give power companies a monopoly and would kill the public power movement. The committee ordered a further hearing on this bill for March 3.

Senate Overrides Veto

Supporters of Senate bill 99, after winning Wednesday's stunning 27-to-3 victory in the Senate, carried their fight to override Governor Snell's veto of the measure to the House today, where both sides agreed the issue would be close.

The bill, which would let power companies keep their power dams for the period for which they are licensed unless public agencies acquire them through condemnation, originally was passed by the House, 46 to 14. Sponsors think they now have 43 votes, or three more than the necessary number to pass the bill over the veto.

The Senate voted yesterday after three hours of torrid debate. Voting to sustain the veto were Sens. Hilton, Portland; McKay, Salem, and Thompson, Albany. Thompson is a Democrat.
