Truman Urges U. S. Role In Caring for Refugees

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—President Truman today asked congress to authorize the United States to participate in an international refugee organization.

Mr. Truman said in a message there are more than 1,000,000 displaced persons still in Germany, Austria and Italy, and told congress: "Almost two-thirds of these are under United States care and control. The allied military victory over the axis powers brought with it a practical moral responsibility with reference to victims of the axis."

A Hot Seat

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Police today were looking for a gunman who robbed and bound two victims and fled with pants afire.

Liquor Contributes Big Share of Federal Taxes

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Whisky, wine and beer accounted for more than seven cents of each \$1 in federal taxes collected during 1946.

Internal revenue figures released today show that the government took in \$2,690,000 from levies on alcoholic beverages—an amount equivalent to about \$19 for each man, woman and child.

Furthermore, these receipts jumped \$321,950,000 over 1945 to hit a record high, while over all federal tax collections fell off \$4,700,000,000 to total \$38,640,000,000.

Jap Faces Gallows For Hong Kong Atrocities

HONG KONG, Feb. 24.—(AP)—Col. Norma Kennosuke, commander of Japanese gendarmes

during the occupation of Hong Kong, was convicted as a war criminal today by a British court and was sentenced to be hanged. Kennosuke—the 51st Japanese to be tried here and the tenth condemned to death—was accused specifically of responsibility for cruel and inhuman treatment accorded allied prisoners of war.

Nine other Japanese have been sentenced to prison terms of 10 years or more, 26 to minor terms and six have been acquitted. Seventy-eight more still are awaiting trial.

THE SWAMI WORKS

Last week we promised to give you "the dope" on the turkey business. This week the proposition looks like pretty big business. Anybody can guess, and now we sorta wish we had let somebody else do the guessing besides us.

The turkey business looks awful bad. Everybody agrees, eh? So if we just advise you to raise turkeys we are immediately reminded that we must have feed to sell. Well, we do have feed to sell. Try to make an honest living doing just that. Still, we know we couldn't last too long in the feed business if we promoted business that would lose big money for our customers.

So we won't offer any advice, free or otherwise. Will instead, just give you some facts, paint the picture as we see it, and let you be the judge, prosecutor and jury.

(1) Storage holdings are the highest on record. The 5-year average shows turkey holdings increase from 60 to 70 million pounds in January. Last year they increased from 108 to 134 million and this year from 128 to 140 million.

Total holdings of poultry normally decrease from 251 to 233 million pounds; last year they increased from 355 to 363, and this year there was again an increase from 316 to 317 million. So far, during February, poultry, including turkeys, have decreased more rapidly than normal. Holdings in 35 largest cities Feb. 17th were 210,000,000 lbs. compared to 273,000,000 lbs. last year, and a 5-year average of 162,000,000 lbs. The storage picture is brighter.

(2) Production will be greatly reduced this year. Government figures indicate at least a 16% decrease, but breeder hens are reported to be 30 to 40% below last year. Very few orders have been confirmed, comparatively, whereas last year orders for millions of pounds were already in the hands of hatcherymen. With the smaller breeding flock, it would be necessary to hatch every egg from now till July to equal last year's flock.

(3) Feed will be plentiful. Prices early in the season will

average above last year's starting feeds. Grains will average higher, even though corn is cheaper. In spite of the biggest wheat crop on record, prices for wheat are now the highest since World War I. A huge crop of wheat is growing, and after June wheat should be much lower. Except grains, other feed ingredients will be cheaper and more plentiful.

(4) Prices for turkeys will probably be somewhere near the present support level at the lowest. However, if the crop turns out to be as small as present figures indicate, the price could easily be high enough that the Stengel law would not need to be invoked.

Support prices, as most everyone knows are 41½¢ for hens under 16 lbs. dressed, and 32½¢ for heavy hens and all toms. At these figures, some margin should be made on heavy birds, and a fair profit on hens. We talked with several growers this past season who had produced for 26¢ or less, exclusive of labor.

(5) We know where you can get some of the best bred poulters in the world for 65¢ each. Not many breeders in this part of the country, and many of those being kept for eggs contracted to eastern hatcheries. We tested less than half as many hens as were kept last year, and less than a fourth as many as in 1945.

That is the picture. Our opinion is that whenever nobody wants to raise spuds is a good time to raise them. Or said in another way, "when the crowd stands still, start running." We truly believe that the man with turkeys next Thanksgiving can do some dictating.

WE WONDER WHY

A man says "Why don't feed drop when eggs drop." We wonder too, though it has happened, strangely enough. Course egg production increases in the spring, and we don't harvest feed till summer and fall.

We wonder why the biggest wheat crop in history also brings the highest price. Course, that's fine for the wheat grower, provided he still has control of the wheat. We wonder why the Government takes chances on producing shortages in this country by buying and shipping all the wheat it can get to for-

eign countries. Course we gotta keep Germany and Japan satisfied so they won't start another war right off.

But we wonder most of all why more people don't buy their feed at the Douglas County Flour Mill. Course, most of them do, at that. But the ones who don't seem to cuss the loudest at the high price of feed and the low price of what they sell.
