## Anti-Nazi Seek Heavier Penalty for Von Papan

**MUNICH, Feb. 25.**—(AP)—Franz von Papan, veteran Nazi diplomat, faced the possibility of a new trial today as Bavarian denazification officials threatened to have the former envoy's eight-year sentence appealed in an attempt to obtain a maximum penalty of 10 years.

The eight-year sentence was imposed upon Von Papan by a Nuremberg denazification court yesterday, after it had convicted him of having supported the Nazi regime in Germany. His personal fortune was confiscated. Bavarian denazification officials felt, however, that this was "not enough" and said that Minister Alfred Loritz would ask the Nuremberg prosecutor to appeal the sentence.
