man coal is under the ground. And, in spite of huge numbers of idle people, the Germans can't get enough of it brought to the surface to supply even their basic needs—not to mention the amount needed to get the German economy back onto a self-supporting basis.

WE newspaper people—not merely here in the United States, but all over the world—are wringing our hands and shedding salty tears because we can't get paper enough.

Paper is in such scarce supply that it is by way of becoming another bootleg commodity. We haven't as yet, but we may hear of paper trucks being hijacked of their cargoes as were the moonshine trucks of the prohibition era.

Distraught publishers, scraping for enough paper to keep their presses running at something like a satisfactory rate, wouldn't be too much surprised to hear of gangster bands specializing in paper as Al Capone and his unworthy henchmen once specialized in illegal hooch and dope.

LACK of coal lies at the root of a lot of our paper troubles. Norway and Sweden, as well as Finland, were great paper producers before the war. They could do it again. They leave no doubt, in their utterances for publication, that they would like to be back in the paper manufacturing business in a big way.

But it takes power to make paper—a lot of power, for the first step in the making of the kind of paper used by newspapers is holding the end of a log against a huge grindstone which whittles the fibers of the wood down into the stuff of which pulp is made. In that part of the world, the bulk of the power is supplied by the combustion of coal. And they can't get coal enough. The great metropolitan dailies of Britain, with circulations running into the millions, are publishing in the main only insignificant little editions of four pages.

If the British could trade coal for it, they could get all the paper they want from nearby Scandinavia, which wants coal and has pulp wood to throw at the birds.

BUT, as you have read in the papers, including this one (probably to the point of nausea), the British can't get enough coal dug to keep themselves warm, let alone coal to swap for Scandinavian paper.

It is the well-known vicious circle.

It isn't just coal that is lacking in the world. More or less everything (excepting, of course, apples and potatoes, and things like that) seems to be in short supply. All because people in the mass don't seem to want to work enough to make enough of the things they want.

This writer wonders sometimes if we haven't listened so long to the wand-waving and trick mirror schools of politicians that we have forgotten the fundamental fact, well-known to our pioneer ancestors, that it takes WORK to make things.

ANYWAY, we aren't much interested in Admiral Byrd's news that there may be coal at the south pole. What we'd like to hear is a good, sound, sure-fire formula for making people all over the world WANT to dig coal.

Maybe a little more of the principle of the Golden Rule might turn the trick. We've tried about everything else. It might be worth while to give that a try.

ENLARGING COMMISSIONS

The bill recently passed in the lower house of the state legislature to enlarge the Oregon State Highway Commission from three to five members is, in our opinion, poor legislation. Increasing commission membership only adds to community rivalry; it does not promote working efficiency. A larger commission would be more susceptible to outside pressure, less prone to consider needs of the state as a whole.

The proposal to enlarge the commission doubtless stems from local dissatisfactions. General areas, particularly in Eastern Oregon, believe they are being neglected in distribution of highway funds and in the highway construction program. Their solution to this problem is to secure larger representation on the commission. Application of this theory would encourage "pork barrel" appropriations. Carried to exaggerated degree it would mean that every community in the state should have a representative on the commission to assure fair treatment.

Dissatisfaction with the work of the Highway Commission is as certain as taxes. Every community in the state is crying for more and better highways. But there is a limit to the amount of money available and to the volume of work to be contracted each year. Each community, therefore, is competing for appropriations and feels its own local projects to be of greater importance than jobs contracted in other parts of the state. The offended community believes it could get better recognition if it had one of its qualified residents sitting on the commission.

Nor is this theory without foundation. Some of the highway commissioners in past years did quite well by their particular localities. Eugene fared exceptionally well. Portland, with a perennial commissioner, hasn't suffered. Klamath Falls nearly wrested the federal designation from Highway 99 through its commissioner.

Local pressures work, too, in a more indirect way. Department employees in a commissioner's district would be only human if they worked a little harder to do a perfect job than those under less close scrutiny.

Several years ago the Highway Commission adopted a formula for distribution of funds. This formula was based on population, distance, property valuations and area. But the formula has been changed from time to time until little of the original base remains.

Here in Douglas County we, too, feel need for immediate help from the Highway Commission. Our rapidly growing industries are resulting in most serious traffic bottlenecks. The section immediately north of Roseburg is a deathtrap. Traffic becomes badly snarled. There is need for a four-lane highway at least as far as Winchester, where the Quaker Industries factory soon will be in full operation, adding more traffic, while only a few miles north at Oerdington, immediately beyond Wilbur, two more industrial plants will be rising soon. Between Roseburg and Winchester there will be two and probably more new industries, in addition to all the homes and business houses sprouting like mushrooms. It is very important that we secure assistance from the Highway Commission in providing facilities to handle the rapidly growing volume of traffic. If we are to follow the formula, which the bill now before the legislature offers, our program should be to increase the Highway Commission to six members so that we, too, might have a member to work in our behalf.
