Game Commission Draws Central Oregon Attack

MADRAS, Ore., March 5. —(P) Preliminary organization of the central Oregon sportsmen's council was completed here last night and officers will be elected at another meeting Monday. The council, representing sportsmen's groups from The Dalles, Dufur, Maupin, Bend, Prineville, Redmond and Madras, heard a series of talks attacking State Game Commission policies. Speakers urged that a legislative interim committee study the entire field of wildlife control.

Henry Hullett of the Prineville Izaak Walton league said the commission was beginning to take steps in the right direction but that it was not going far enough. It needs more biologists and other technicians to develop a proper program, he said.

Italy Bans Return of Two Ex-Kings and Descendants

ROME, March 5. —(P) — A government decree published today provided that if former Kings Vittorio Emanuele and Umberto ever returned to Italy they would be turned over to the police and as "foreigners, expelled from the territory of the state."

The edict, voted recently by the cabinet, also forbade male descendants of the two to return. It prohibited the former kings from disposing of their property in Italy pending a government decision.

Vittorio Emanuele, who abdicated in May, 1946, is in Egypt. Umberto, exiled in the plebiscite of June, 1946, is in Portugal.

School Heads Asked To Decry Strikes

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., March 5. —(P) — Delegates to the 73rd annual convention of the American Association of School Administrators were asked to day to disapprove teacher strikes because "this type of conduct will react ultimately to the detriment of teaching as a profession."

"All efforts for improvement, to retain community support, must be on a professional level through representatives democratically selected with recognition that the educational interests of the pupil are paramount," said a resolution presented to the convention.

Another resolution recommended a minimum salary of \$2,400 a year for "professionally-trained" teachers and as maximum pay of \$5,000 or better.

Congress was asked in a resolution to appropriate \$20,000,000 to be allocated to states in amounts required to complete 1947 school lunch programs.

R. F. Forrester, Retired Bridge Carpenter, Dies
Robert Franklin Forrester, 70, retired bridge carpenter of the Southern Pacific, was found dead this morning on the front porch of his home at Miller Addition, Sgt. William H. Upham of the city police reported.

Death was believed due to natural causes, Upham said. The body was removed to the Roseburg Funeral Home.

Survivors include two sons and a daughter: Marvin Forrester, Coos Bay; Robert Forrester, Roseburg; and Mrs. R. D. Horne, Reno, Nev.

Parking Rules Violator Meets Considerate Cops
SPRINGFIELD, Ill., March 5. —(P) — Don Robertson, Chicago salesman, told police on his arrival at headquarters with an overtime parking ticket that he was prepared to pay up to \$15 fine and take the usual tongue-lashing "I get up north" in Chicago.

Police politely told him to put away his billfold. Because he had responded so promptly they told him he would have to pay only five cents—the amount he had forgotten to put in the parking meter.

Robertson was so surprised he paid the nickel and donated \$10 to the policemen's pension fund.

Stalin Gives Up Post as Armed Forces Minister
LONDON, March 6. —(P) — Prime Minister Stalin has stepped out as Minister of Soviet Armed Forces because of the "excessive pressure of his main work," the Moscow radio says, and has handed the job on to Gen. Nikolai A. Bulganin, who is regarded as one of Russia's most skilled administrators.

Stalin continues as prime minister, as head of the powerful Politburo and of the Orgburo — supervising organization of the Communist Party, as general secretary of the party and as a member of the presidium of the Supreme Soviet — an executive and directive body of the parliament.
