Washington county. The camp, located at a state-owned former CCC camp, will be for boys between 12 and 18 years old who can be rehabilitated. The boys would be given forestry work, particularly reseeded part of the Willamette burn.

The bill carries a \$100,000 appropriation. Governor Snell recommended that the legislature pass a bill to let counties and cities establish such camps with state financial support, but Rep. O. H. Bengtson, Medford, one of the principal sponsors, said the House Social Welfare Committee didn't think the governor's plan was wise. He said the committee felt that the counties and cities wouldn't do anything about establishing the camps.

He said the camp would relieve overcrowding at the State Training School at Woodburn, which eventually will be used for only the toughest prisoners.

Bengtson said the Timber camp would care for more than 50 boys. **Mudguards Voted**

The Senate sent to the House a bill to prohibit motor vehicles from throwing wheel spray to the rear. In effect, it would require trucks to have fenders or mudguards.

Bills passed by the House and sent to the governor would prohibit any other law enforcement agency from wearing uniforms similar to those of the state police, and establish hours for county offices from 8 A. M. to 5 P. M. daily except Saturday, when they would be from 8 A. M. to noon.

World Trade Must Be Freer, Truman Declares

world," and added: "Whether we like it or not, the future pattern of economic relations depends upon us. The world is waiting and watching to see what we shall do. The choice is ours. We can lead the nations to economic peace or we can plunge them into economic war."

"There must be no question as to our course. We must not go through the 'thirties' again."

He said reduction of trade barriers is a "settled policy" of this government, one of the "cornerstones of our plans for peace," and "a policy from which we cannot—and must not—turn aside."

Reactionaries Warned—"To those among us—and there are still a few—who would seek to undermine this policy for partisan advantage and go back to the period of high tariffs and economic isolation," he continued, "I can say only this:

"Take care! Times have changed. Our position in the world has changed. The temper of the people has changed. The slogans of 1930 or of 1896 are sadly out of date. Isolationism, after two world wars, is a confession of mental and moral bankruptcy."

Bi-Partisan Support Asked—As for bi-partisan cooperation, he said:

"Happily, our foreign economic policy does not now rest upon a base of narrow partisanship. Leaders in both parties have espoused their faith in its essential purposes. Here, as elsewhere in our foreign relations, I shall welcome a continuation of bi-partisan support."

"Our people are united. They have come to a realization of their responsibilities. They are ready to assume their role of leadership. They are determined upon an international order in which peace and freedom shall endure."

Must Reverse Trend—Mr. Truman said the pattern of international trade most conducive to freedom of enterprise is one in which the major decisions are made not by governments but by "private buyers and sellers, under conditions of active competition" and with proper safeguards against the establishment of monopolies and cartels.

He described the opposite pattern as one where governments make the decisions, with public officials dictating the quantity of purchases and sales, sources of imports and destination of exports.

"This was the pattern of the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries," the President said. "Unless we act, and act decisively, it will be the pattern of the next century."

Everywhere on earth, he went on, nations are under "economic pressure," with a tendency toward rigid control of imports.

"If this trend is not reversed," he said, "the government of the United States will be under pressure, sooner or later, to use these same devices in the fight for markets and for raw materials. And if the government were to yield to this pressure, it would shortly find itself in the business of allocating foreign goods among importers and foreign markets among exporters and telling every trader what he could buy or sell, and how much, and when, and where."

"This is precisely what we have been trying to get away from, as rapidly as possible, ever since the war. It is not the American way. It is not the way to peace."

Britain Places Orders in Oregon for Fir Lumber

PORTLAND, March 6. (AP)—Establishment of a British lumber procurement mission for purchase of Oregon-Washington lumber was revealed today by industrial spokesmen here. Lumbermen who declined to be

quoted said the mission has already placed orders for 260 million board feet of fir for delivery during the year.

British Consul James McDonald said amounts to be purchased would be determined under export quotas now being negotiated in Washington, D. C.
