Mrs. Dickinson had just returned from a trip to Russia, prior to the national convention. She will pay her official visit to the clubs of Oregon the latter part of May and every club in the state will endeavor at that time to send its president to the convention to take part in special

ceremonies honoring Mrs. Dickinson.

Mrs. Chandlee's talk was most sincere and her appeal to all club members to work for peace and friendship with all peoples of the world brought her subject to a close. Following the dinner, Mrs. Chandlee personally greeted all clubwomen and guests present.
