Vets' Work Aide Visits Roseburg

Promotion of job opportunities for veterans, with special emphasis upon the placement of disabled veterans, is the mission of M. E. Fisher of Medford, field assistant for the Veterans Employment Service, U. S. Department of Labor.

Fisher visited Roseburg Saturday for the first time since his appointment to the Veterans Employment Service. His territory includes Douglas, Lane, Coos, Curry, Klamath, Lake, Josephine, and Jackson counties.

Work with veterans at the Oregon State Employment Service office in Roseburg, under direction of George C. Bailey, was termed "very, very good" by Fisher.

"My job is the proper placing of veterans in their own trade, or where they may best use their own skills," Fisher said. "Many such veterans take any work they can find rather than remain idle. If they so inform their local employment office, they may be placed on the 'active' list for jobs in their own field."

Fisher said his work also includes contacting employers to educate them regarding the services of the employment office.

Fisher, himself a veteran of the Navy, was with the State Unemployment Compensation Commission one year before joining the Veterans Employment Service, which is a branch of the United States Employment Service.

In some cases, the bankers act as leaders for the latter project. The Oregon Bankers also entertain the outstanding 4-H boy and girl at their annual meeting, and engrave the Bankers' Trophy annually with the name of the outstanding 4-H girl in the state.

The Roseburg Branch of the U. S. National Bank also awards one 4-H Summer School scholarship to an outstanding boy or girl from Douglas County and provides fifth year 4-H member pins for all Douglas County 4-H members.

Blind Partianship Of Hawaiians Bans Legislative Work

HONOLULU, March 10.—(AP)—Take 15 Republicans and 15 Democrats, add one jigger of party loyalty, a stiff dash of never-say-die, stir well and you have Hawaii's house of representatives.

Heavy stuff too. Makes headlines and headlines in the islands. But no legislation—because the house hasn't been able to do a lick of work since it convened Feb. 19. Hasn't even organized.

Daily the resolute 15 Republican representatives and the 15 Democrat representatives meet and resolutely disagree on everything except adjournment.

The other half of the territorial legislature, the senate, is O. K. The Republicans have a majority.

But the house! It takes a steering committee—five members from each party—to set procedure allowing the leaderless house to meet.

Some citizens see nothing funny in this. They're yelling to form another district right now so one more representative can get in there and break it up.

Legislators open out here with hula girls. Hardly had the last hip quit shaking when the fight over the house speakership broke out.

Fourteen deadlocked ballots made tenders as short as a nickel beer.

The Republicans called the Democrats puppets of the CIO-PAC. The Democrats called the Republicans tools of Hawaii's big business.

Republicans offered to keep the speakership and give the Democrats half the membership on committees. The Democrats offered to take a vice-speakership if they got a majority on half the committees.

There was a brief pause in hostilities for Gov. Ingram M. Stahlnback, who had been waiting all that time, to make his address last Tuesday. Then the boys brought out the hammer and tongs again.

Today, after 14 legislative days, the air is full of compromise. While the lawmakers gather ideas on how to break a deadlock, the bills in the hopper gather dust.
