Rebuke Given Molotov For False Charge

suggested that France replace Germany as the great steel-producing nation of Europe.

Bidault withheld France's agreement to American, British and Soviet proposals for raising the level of German industry. He said the French view depended upon what other controls were set up. He rejected outright the American-sponsored plan to set up central administrative agencies run by the Germans, pending decisions on Germany's frontiers. He evidently meant that decisions on the Ruhr, the Rhineland and the Saar must be reached first.

The French minister called for a speed-up in reparations from the western zone, thus siding with demands made by Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov. At the same time, however, he declared that in line with the British and American policies, Germany must pay for goods—mainly food—that she now is receiving from the Allied powers.

He stressed, above all, the French determination "that Germany shall no longer be able to use her mining and industrial resources in preparation for another war."

Wants Germany Tied
Of the \$1,330,000,000 in reparations thus far assessed against the losers of the recent war, 67 per cent, or \$890,000,000, has been awarded to the Soviet Union,

which yesterday demanded an additional \$10,000,000,000 in compensation for war losses from Germany.

Russia, the only major power to claim reparations, gets \$100,000,000 from Italy, \$200,000,000 from Hungary and \$300,000,000 each from Romania and Finland by the terms of peace treaties signed in February.

Other nations awarded reparations include Yugoslavia, \$200,000,000; Greece, \$150,000,000; Albania, \$50,000,000; Bulgaria, \$50,000,000; Czechoslovakia, \$50,000,000; Hungary, \$50,000,000.

First Bill Never Paid

Russia's new \$10,000,000,000 demand against Germany amounts to almost a third of the total assessed against Germany by all the Allies after the First World War, when an Allied financial council fixed the German bill at 132,000,000,000 gold marks—or approximately \$33,000,000,000.

The winners collected only a small fraction of that total, however, and it never was paid in full, even after the Young plan, named for Owen D. Young, who formulated it in 1929—cut the bill to \$9,000,000,000 and gave the Germans until 1988 to pay.

Finally, in 1931, at the height of the world-wide depression, all reparations payments were abandoned at the suggestion of President Hoover, who declared an indefinite moratorium on such payments.

Attendants Needed at Veterans Hospital

The Roseburg Veterans Hospital is in need of men as hospital attendants, reports Dr. George M. Melvin, manager. This is due to the greater number of veterans being cared for and the increased services being made available to them.

The wage for the work is \$152 per month for a five-day week, with considerable overtime work available. Overtime is paid at the usual rate of time and a half. Liberal vacation time and sick leave are granted with these jobs.

For single men who wish to live at the hospital, barracks quarters are available at \$27.50 per month for board and room. Further information on this employment may be obtained from the personnel office at the hospital.

Summer-Like Spell In Oregon Diminishes

PORTLAND, March 18.—(AP)—Low clouds throughout the Willamette Valley and high cloudiness elsewhere in the state interrupted Oregon's summer-like weather which brought the season's first forest fires.

The weather bureau forecast some lifting of the clouds this afternoon, but temperatures were expected to be materially below those of yesterday.

The forest fires—both small and in the Applegate district—were reported yesterday. One along the highway near Jacksonville was controlled quickly. The other, in the Quartz Gulch region, was in brush and small trees, covering about 25 acres.

The mercury was at 82 degrees yesterday at Medford. Other marks: Roseburg and Portland 78, Salem 77, Klamath Falls 75, Eugene 74, Pendleton 72, Baker 68.
