Bitter Fight Shaping Over Sales Tax Bill

but banned all other forms of
fireworks.

The House had voted to ban all
fireworks except those exhibits
licensed by the state fire mar-
shal.

The Senate Committee changed
the latter provision to read that
exhibitions should be licensed by
the nearest fire chief.

When the bill arrived in the
Senate, several children organ-
ized their own lobby "in behalf
of the kids of Oregon."

The Senate defeated a resolu-
tion calling for an interim com-
mittee to investigate all of the
healing arts in Oregon, including
physicians, osteopaths, chiroprac-
tors and all other professions
which seek to cure human ail-
ments.

Session Limit Sought—
Rep. Kimberling, Prairie City,
who, like most other legislators,
is getting weary at the current
legislative session, said he is in-
troducing a proposed constitu-
tional amendment to limit the
legislative session to 60 days.

The measure also would pay
legislators \$10 a day for each of
the 60 days. The lawmakers now
get \$8 a day for the first 50 days,
and nothing thereafter.

Yesterday was the 65th day of
the session, and prospects are
that it will last at least 76 days.

The Joint Ways and Means

Committee recommended passage
of bills to let the State Board of
Control build a \$2,500,000 state
office building in Portland, and
to transfer jurisdiction of the
State Blind Trades School in Port-
land to the Board of Control from
the Blind Commission, which
would be abolished.

The Portland building would be
financed by money borrowed from
the state school fund. It
would be repaid by rentals, with
interest.

State offices in Portland now
are scattered over much of the
city.

Snell Approves 2 Bills

Governor Snell signed into law
today House Bill 412, which closes
part of Illinois River to boat
fishing.

Snell also signed bills to relieve
State Postwar Director John W.
Kelly from also serving as Wil-
lamette Basin commission secre-
tary and to set up a state parks
department within the Highway
commission.

The House sent to the governor
a bill giving the board of health
power to license and inspect ice
plants, and killed a measure to
increase from \$10,000 to \$20,000
the maximum amount of dam-
ages that can be collected for
negligent homicide.

Relief Fund Voted For Six Foreign Countries

WASHINGTON, March 19.—
(AP)—The House Foreign Affairs
committee voted today for ex-
penditure of \$350,000,000 for re-
lief in five European countries
and China.

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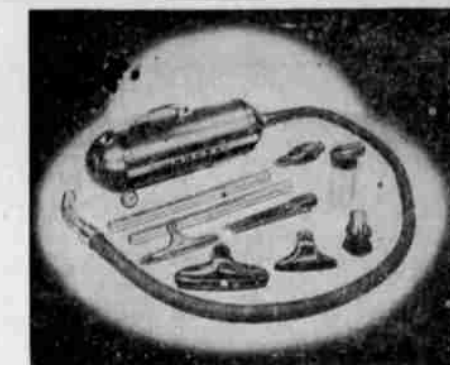
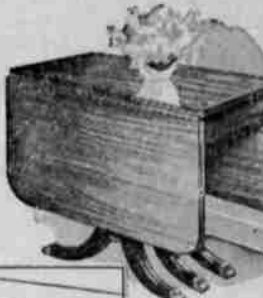
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
