Asst. Manager of Bank Unit Named

Announcement was made by E. C. Sammons, president of the United States National Bank of Portland, today, that Clarence E. Parker has been made assistant manager of the Myrtle Creek Branch.

Parker, a native of New England, received his education in the State of Vermont, where he also completed various courses offered by the American Institute of Banking.

Parker has been a resident of the Pacific Coast since 1923, when he became associated with the Los Angeles Branch of the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco. Prior to that, he had been connected with the First National Bank of North Bennington, Vermont.

After leaving the Federal Reserve Bank in 1943, he engaged in private business until joining

the ranks of the United States National on June 1, 1946. His appointment as assistant manager became effective March 1.

"We are happy," commented E. E. Church, manager of the Myrtle Creek Branch, "to have the able services of Mr. Parker recognized through his appointment as assistant manager. He will be of great assistance to us in developing further the many activities of this branch."

Bills to Curb Labor Unions Passed by Senate

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35 to 24 by the House and sent to the governor.

The bill limits throughway construction to new routes, relocated highways, and on existing roads where there are less than 10 commercial establishments per mile.

Welfare Crisis Worsened

The public welfare crisis became more acute today after the federal social security board told the state public welfare commission that all federal welfare funds for Oregon would be cut off for April, May and June unless Multnomah county can show immediately it can raise its share of the welfare costs for that period.

This means that the state will have to pay Multnomah's \$330,000 welfare deficit for those months.

The public welfare program for the next biennium, which Governor Snell and the public welfare commission had set for \$51,000,000, was pruned to \$41,000,000 by the joint ways and means subcommittee on welfare. The program now is on the basis of \$51,000,000, and the commission warned that to prune it would cause suffering.

The subcommittee also agreed to match county welfare funds on the basis of 70 per cent state and 30 per cent by the counties. The ratio now is 60-40 on old age assistance, and 85-15 on general assistance.

Debate Period Limited

The Senate curbed debate today, limiting each senator to five minutes on any one bill. The action came after the Senate had spent all day yesterday debating three bills. The House took similar action 11 days ago.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 2 P. M. in the Chapel of the Long and Orr Mortuary. Interment will follow in the Masonic Cemetery. The Rev. Walter A. MacArthur of the Methodist Church will officiate at the service.
