

### Opinion Splits On Orange R Ouster Of Class Numeral

Sentiment among members of both Roseburg Junior and Senior High student bodies was divided yesterday afternoon as the perennial numeral adorning the side of Mt. Nebo was replaced with an orange letter R at the decision of

an inter-school council representing both schools. Although most of them admitted that the defacing of school property and physical injury did not fit in with class spirit, some were of the opinion it is too drastic to kill the spirit entirely by doing away with the marking of their class number.

That a better plan would be the construction of a cement R with a spot for both the senior class and the sophomores was the suggestion of two members of the high school's letterman club, with the proviso that it would be the duty of sophomores each year to repaint the R.

A member of the girls' league, high school athletic organization, stated that "we have fought long enough—it's time to end the whole business with the present plan." The tradition of the Mt. Nebo

numeral is said to have begun in 1901, when it was decided that the senior class number would reign throughout the year. Later a large R was placed adjoining the seniors' numerals as part of the yearly sophomore initiation in Senior High. In 1911, it is reported, the two schools decided to do away with the numeral altogether because of the dangerous inclines of the bluff upon which the numerals were placed, but the following year they reappeared and have been a yearly product of class rivalry until today.

### Baseball Assn. Heads to Meet at Changed Date

Postponement of the meeting of the board of directors of the Southern Oregon Baseball Association was announced today by Wallace A. Rapp. It will be held at Medford's Chamber of Commerce office Sunday, March 30. The meeting was originally slated for March 23.

The Medford meeting was canceled until the later date because of the inconvienience of several board representatives.

Business of the meeting at Medford will include thrashing out the various rules to govern this year's playing season, introduction of umpires from the home of each team, and deciding whether or not Roseburg and Gold Hill will be allowed to enter 1947 competition.

### Mrs. Broadhurst Given Life Term for Murder

VALE, Ore., March 21.—(P)—Mrs. Gladys Lincoln Broadhurst, convicted slayer of her sixth husband, W. D. Broadhurst of Caldwell, Idaho, was sentenced to life imprisonment yesterday.

The sentence, pronounced by Circuit Judge M. A. Biggs, was mandatory under the verdict returned last Friday. "I have no statement," the 41-year-old red-head told the court before sentence was passed. Her eyes were swollen by weeping but she was outwardly calm.

She will not start serving the sentence immediately, however, as her attorneys have 23 days in which to present arguments in support of a motion for a new trial.

Earlier Judge Biggs set April 30 as the date for start of the trial of Alvin Lee Williams, 23, charged with first degree murder in the same slaying.

### Dr. Poling Will Address Students of 3 Schools

Roseburg High School will play hosts to senior students of Glady and Camas Valley schools Tuesday, March 25, Alva L. Laws, principal, announced today.

Comparable to a County Senior Day, the visiting students and local high school seniors will be addressed by Dr. Daniel V. Poling of the Oregon State High School Association and a representative of the state's higher education board.

### Douglas Teachers To Attend O. E. A. Meet in Portland

Thirty-odd Roseburg teachers and many Douglas County teachers will attend the 44th annual convention of the Oregon Education Association in Portland on April 7 and 8, according to Charles N. Hill, president of the Douglas County Division of the state association.

The event is the largest annual gathering of Oregon teachers and is Portland's biggest annual convention. General session attendance is expected to exceed 2,500. Sessions will be held in the city auditorium.

Mrs. Pearl A. Wanamaker, president of the National Education Association, will be one of the principal convention speakers. She is widely known for her recent activities with the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organization and is Washington state superintendent of public instruction.

Other speakers will include Dr. Walter H. Judd, congressman from Minnesota and an authority on United States foreign policy; Dr. Kenneth McFarland, superintendent of the Topeka, Kansas, public schools, and Dr. Wilson Compton, president of Washington State College.

### Co-Ed, Boy Friend Held in Death of Former's Parents

SANTA ANA, Calif., March 21.—(P)—A 17-year-old co-ed and her 21 year old boy friend were held today on bookings of murder in the explosion deaths of her parents aboard a yacht, said District Attorney James L. Davis said "there is a definite question whether any complaint will be issued in the case."

Concluding an interview with the girl, the district attorney—who would be called upon to prosecute any charge issued against the pair—said:

"She made certain statements which officers are now checking. If they check out as she said, I think the results would be very favorable to her."

The girl, Beulah Louise Overall, a freshman at the University of Southern California, and George Rector Gollum, 21, were booked yesterday after Sheriff James Musick and Police Chief R. R. Hodgkinson of Newport Beach said they found 38 sticks of dynamite and a time clock aboard the shattered 47-foot yacht of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Overall of Flintridge, exclusive Pasadena suburb.

She and Gollum, husky, bespectacled student, denied any connection with the death in previous questioning.

Asked if his statement regarding Miss Overall, popular member of the junior set, applied also to Gollum, Davis declared: "I believe they are either in or out of this jointly."

JERUSALEM, March 20.—(P)—A British policeman was killed and five other Britons were injured last night by a bomb explosion on the highway between Haifa and Tel Aviv.

An official announcement said the men were returning to their quarters near Hadera after visiting a motion picture theater when the blast occurred.

### STRIKE MAY BE AVERTED

AKRON, O., March 21.—(P)—Union and company officials of the "Big Four" producers of the nation's rubber hinted strongly today that there was still a fair chance of averting a strike set for Sunday midnight.

Leaders of the CIO-United Rubber Workers disclosed that they hadn't given up on the idea of a peaceful settlement of the wage controversy by scheduling a meeting in Cleveland tomorrow.

### Wounded Bandit Flees Through Glass Door

PORTLAND, March 20.—(P)—A gunman who entered Donald S. Scott's service station early today went out through a plate glass door and was believed wounded by his own pistol.

Scott told police he followed the man's instructions to put money from the till into his hat, but as the gunman reached for it, he let loose a kick. In the following melee, the gunman fell through the glass door.

Scott said he picked up the pistol, which had been dropped, and

fired, wounding the man, who made good his escape.

nesia victim picked up Tuesday night had been identified by police as Carl Pierce Wysong, 34, whose wife, Bessie, lives at Ashland, Ore.

Vind said Mrs. Wysong informed him her husband vanished recently after starting for Monmouth, Ore., where a sister lives.
