Broadcasts Will Deal With Soviet

First of a series of six patriotic broadcasts will be presented over KRNK at 4:30 Sunday afternoon by Council 2939, Knights of Columbus, Roseburg. It was announced by Bob Wandling, grand knight.

Central theme of the series of dramatic sketches is the contrast between the life under American democracy and the situation of labor, religion and personal liberty in the U. S. S. R. and Soviet-controlled lands, Wandling said.

The first sketch is a re-enactment of the arrival of Lenin in Moscow during the first world war, the early days of revolution, the birth of the dreaded Cheka and its effects on the lives of the Russian population.

Although presented in dramatic form, Wandling said, every incident portrayed is authentic and key portions of the text are exact quotations from Lenin, Stalin, and other Communist leaders.

The second program in the series will be an exposition of the conditions of labor under the Communist regime.

Garden Invasion By Bugs Launched In Warm Weather

As soon as the weather warms up the bugs are on the march again. At the first sign of spring they engulf your garden in a tidal wave of insect life.

That's your signal to take up arms against the invaders. Pest control is never-ending. Yet in the long run an intelligent campaign pays tremendous dividends in landscape beauty and bumper crops.

It is advisable to start spraying or dusting even before the winged demons arrive. Many of the modern insecticides and fungicides possess repellent value, and thus aid in keeping the bugs from your premises. After the pests have anchored themselves to your prize-winning shrubs troubles will be multiplied a hundredfold.

In purchasing new plants always examine them carefully to make certain they are clean. Frequently garden pests will be found lurking in the joints of the leaves and stems. They'll continue to create havoc when they arrive on your premises. Patronizing a clean nursery helps to solve the pest problem.

No Single Remedy

There is no general cure-all for garden pests. Different types of insects have distinct feeding habits and consequently no one insecticide will kill all classes of bugs.

There are literally hundreds of different insects that cause damage in gardens. Many attack food crops as well as ornamentals. The first factor to be determined is the particular kind of spray or dust that must be used for the pest to be destroyed.

Each insect falls into a certain category, which is dependent on its method of eating. There are sap-sucking insects which obtain their food by drinking the plant juices; there are chewing pests such as caterpillars, beetles, and grasshoppers which actually eat complete sections of a flower leaf or stem; then, too, there are diseases which cause tremendous damage every year in gardens. Finally, there are night prowlers such as snails and slugs, which require a poison bait.

The sap-sucking insects can be controlled with a contact spray, which means they must be hit if any benefit is to be accomplished. The chewing pests may be controlled with lead arsenate or other comparable stomach poisons. This type of material is applied to the plant and when eaten by the bug a certain amount of the poison is also absorbed into the plant's system. In a short time the chewing pests die from the stomach poison.

Diseases and fungi must be controlled by using fungicides, such as sulphur, copper and the new ferimate.

City Planning Talk Given At Rotary Club Meeting

Need for proper building regulations in the field of city planning was cited Thursday noon by Graham Smith, Eugene, member of the State Architectural Examining Board, at the weekly luncheon of the Roseburg Rotary Club.

Smith said he has seen "tremendous growth" in the Roseburg area. He told of the need for zoning and establishment of building codes here.

Smith also spoke at length on various building problems, including radiating heating, which he said is "not new, but you're going to hear more about it." Radiant heating, he explained, is the passage of low-temperature hot water through copper tubing in the ceiling, floors, and walls of dwellings. It is an "economical" way to heat, he said.

States to Vote on Limit To Presidential Terms

WASHINGTON, March 22.—(AP)—The House completed legislative action yesterday on a resolution to put before the nation a constitutional amendment limiting future presidents to two elected terms.

Approval came in accepting, 81 to 29, a Senate amendment which would allow one man to serve a possible maximum of 10 years in the White House.

The resolution is referred to state legislatures automatically and will not become effective until it is ratified by the lawmakers of 36 states.

The amendment provides that no man may be elected president more than twice. A man who has served two years or more of another president's unexpired term may be elected to only one term of his own.

The resolution specifically excludes President Truman from this limitation.

The workshop will be conducted by four instructors of the Southern Oregon College of Education at Ashland.

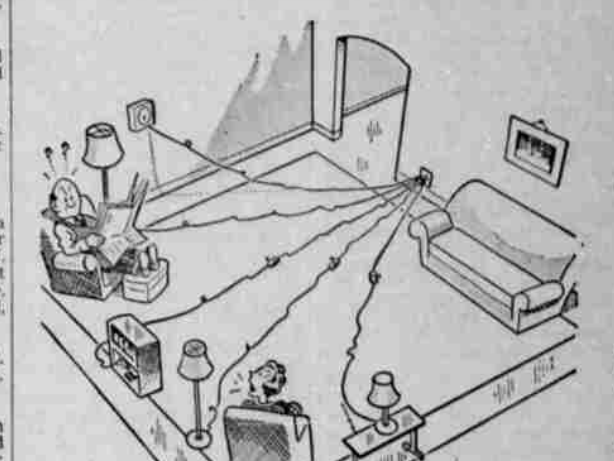
Other workshops for Douglas County teachers are dated March 22 and 23 at Drain, for the north end of the county, and March 24
