dent Truman's carefully worded
foreign policy announcement.
If we are going to back this
new policy with all our lives and
all our property, we need the
blatant truth.

We are slowly beginning to get
it.
ACHESON'S statement came in
the course of what amounted to
cross examination of him by
the foreign relations committee
of the house. Representative Judd
(Minnesota) asked him:
"Would a communist-dominated
government of China be a dan-
ger to United States security?"
He answered, as stated at the
head of this column, that com-
munist-dominated governments
anywhere in the world are dan-
gerous to our security.

You see he mined no words.
A MOMENT later, Judd asked:
"Does the state department
know of any communist govern-
ment in the world that is not So-
viet-dominated?"
Acheson answered:
"Communist organizations
throughout the world appear to
act with a high degree of disci-
pline and unanimity which be-
yond the probability of coinci-
dence."

At this point, Acheson reverted
to the usual words of diplo-
macy. So, in the interest of blan-
tiness, we must translate what he
said into what he meant.

Here is what he meant to con-
vey to the house foreign relations
committee, and thence (since re-
porters were present) to the peo-
ple of the United States:

Russia is communism. She is
the heart and the lungs and the
liver and the BRAIN of it. What-
ever communism does, anywhere
in the world, is directed by Rus-
sia. Russia is the general staff of
communism. What Russia plans,
communists everywhere carry
out.

So if communism is to be stop-
ped before it engulfs us or seri-
ously limits our future, it must be
stopped before it gets too big.
Since RUSSIA IS COMMUNISM
Russia must be stopped before she
gets too big to handle.

That is the long and the short
of our new foreign policy.

DATA ON POST OFFICES

At last we have learned the origin of the name "Elgarose." Readers of this column will recall that in our search for information regarding old Douglas County post offices, we asked origin of names of each of the stations. The name "Elgarose" had researchers baffled.

Charles Olson, Melrose Rt., Roseburg, supplies the missing link.

Elgarose, he reports, gets its name from a town in Sweden, birthplace of the Rev. Mr. Carlson, first postmaster. The Elgarose post office was opened in 1916 and was continued until 1924. It was first supplied from the Melrose post office, where Tom Scott was postmaster, and later was made a Star route from Melrose. Both Melrose and Elgarose are now served by motor routes from the Roseburg office.

Information on other post offices in the same general area is supplied by Mrs. Viola Ward Josselyn, Ashland, Ore.

Mrs. Josselyn, who admits to 75 years of age, is the daughter of the late Frazier Ward, who was one of the first settlers in what became known as French Settlement, when five French families settled in the area. Mrs. Josselyn's grandfather was Hoy Flournoy who had crossed the plains about the same time Frazier Ward was making the arduous journey. Flournoy, for whom the valley immediately west of Roseburg was named, is reported by Mrs. Josselyn to have named Lookingglass, Tennille, and Camas Valley sections.

Frazier Ward, about 1890, established the Wardton post office, two and one-half miles west of Melrose. Mrs. Josselyn was postmistress for several years.

The Melrose post office originally was known as Hogan but was given its modern title after the land was purchased by the Scott family.

Louis post office, which was another on our list previously unidentified, was located on the Gibson donation land claim in Shoestring valley, nine miles east of Yoncalla and on the old military road from Cottage Grove to Oakland, we are informed by Mrs. Fred Lee of Yoncalla.

Later it was moved to the John Johnson place and took the name Ila, being located at the foot of Latham mountain. Mail was carried once weekly by a Mr. Cathcart. Service three times weekly was provided after the route was shifted to include Elkhead. Daily service now is provided from Yoncalla to Elkhead, Shoestring and Scott's Valley.

Paul Allen lives on the Gibson place and Walter Thorp on the Johnson place.

Information received from the many persons who have so kindly sent in data on early day post offices, is being forwarded to Mr. Lewis A. McArthur, Portland, who is reporting in the Oregon Historical Society quarterly.

Mr. McArthur also contributes to this column the information that Locust Grove, 1858-63, was located near the present Rice Hill community on the old road between Yoncalla and Oakland. Richard Smith was postmaster.

Of the original list supplied by Mr. McArthur we have now secured complete or partial data on all except two stations, Alderbrook, 1855-59, and Bentzen, or Bentzer. Of the latter there is no knowledge of the date of existence, or even assurance that the name is correct.

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Myrtle Creek to Test New Fire Equipment

MYRTLE CREEK—Extensive tests will be given equipment of the Myrtle Creek Fire Department beginning today through Friday, March 28, in order to familiarize new residents with the alarm and also to detect any possible defects in equipment, in preparation for the coming dry season.

The tests, directed by Fire Chief Frank Chapin, include the alarm equipment which, at 12 A. M. daily will sound, and all fire plugs, hose and other equipment. Chapin requests that if a fire should break out during the test period, a call be immediately placed with the telephone company office, for transmission to the fire department. All members will be on the alert during the test periods. The actual alarm test will be held precisely at noon and any other alarm may be considered to be a real call. He also stated that tentative delivery of the city's new fire truck has been set for late in April.

Parks Wins Over Weaver; Dillard Defeats Trudell

Slammed all over the mat, then hurled through the ropes onto the floor Herb Parks, Canadian "meathead," looked like a sure loser to Buck Weaver in the wrestling headliner at the Roseburg Armory, Saturday night. A crowd of climbing back onto the mat and staggering to his feet, while Referee Elton Owen held his antagonist at arm's length, Parks suddenly flung himself at Weaver's legs, flattened him and flipped him over into a Boston crab hold, to take the third fall and the match. The time was 5:43.

Parks won the opening fall of the bout in 1:57 with a body whirl and a press; Weaver annexed fall No. 2 in 5:12 with his specialty—a backward flip followed by a neck twist. A crowd of 500 was on hand for the program, which opened with a three-stanza affair between another Canadian "roughie," bewhiskered Benny Trudell, and Dory Dillard, Indiana university alumnus bearing the title of Big Nine Conference mat champion.

With a fall to the credit of each grappler, Dillard was given the decision in the third round when Referee Owen disqualified Trudell for repeated nasty tactics, climaxed when the official was carried by his fists to make the Canadian behave. Trudell gained the first fall in 1:50 with a prope back stretch, and Dillard got the second one with a combination leg nelson and jack-knife. The final round was halted at the end of nine minutes of hectic brawling.

Sooners Defeat Longhorns; O. S. C. Downs Wyoming

KANSAS CITY, March 24.—(AP)—The University of Oklahoma Sooners will be after the west's sixth straight N. C. A. A. basketball crown when they tangle with Holy Cross, the Eastern champion, in New York City's Madison Square Garden tomorrow night.

The Sooners came up with one of their greatest games of the year in beating a fine University of Texas Longhorn team, 55 to 54, in a frenzied finish Saturday night in the western N. C. A. A. playoff finals. A long jump shot by Kenneth Ryor, who played less than two minutes, gave Oklahoma the title with ten seconds remaining.

A Sooner victory in New York would mean three successive national titles for teams from the state of Oklahoma. The Oklahoma A and M Aggies have won the last two championships.

Oregon State's Beavers, who lost in the opening round to Oklahoma by two points, trounced the University of Wyoming Cowboys, 63 to 46, in a consolation contest. Lew Heck, guard for Oregon State who hit for 20 points each night, led the four teams in scoring. Three times within a minute Heck intercepted Wyoming passes and dribbled in for goals that broke up a close game and gave Oregon State a 32-to-27 halftime lead.

Reedsport Wins State Legion Hoop Crown

PORTLAND, March 24.—(AP)—Reedsport won the state American Legion basketball championship here yesterday with a 53-36 victory over Portland Post No. 1. The winners trailed 15-14 in the first quarter but rallied for a 28-22 halftime advantage which they never lost thereafter. The margin was 40-28 at the end of the third quarter.

Broken Electric Wire Deals Death to Handler

GRANTS PASS, Ore., March 24.—(AP)—Henry Volkman, 65, was killed Saturday as he tried to move the broken end of a high voltage wire from a pile of lumber. The wire had been broken in tree-trimming operations.

Truman Orders Loyalty Probe of Federal Workers

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—President Truman Saturday ordered a purge of all government employees where there are "reasonable grounds" to doubt their loyalty and set up sweeping new standards to test it.

His executive order directed a "loyalty investigation" of every one who applies for a job in the executive departments and agencies without exception, where now only questionable applicants are tested.

And it instructed the agencies to submit the names of all their present employees to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for a check wherever this has not already been done.

The attorney general is ordered to make a list and keep it up to date, of all subversive organizations. A person's membership in or "sympathetic association with" one of them will be ground for stamping him disloyal.

This blacklist is to include all "totalitarian, fascist, communist, or subversive" groups; all that advocate or approve force to deny persons their constitutional rights; and all that seek to change the form of the government "by unconstitutional means."

Moreover, a "central master index" was ordered set up of all persons whose loyalty has been investigated since Sept. 1, 1939. It may be referred to by all government agencies.

A White House official said that "this will not be a witch hunt. I can't imagine that any great number of firings will result."

The order does not apply to the judicial or legislative branches of the government, he emphasized, nor does it involve changes in present security rules of the armed forces.

Wider Battle on Tree Pests Asked

WASHINGTON, March 24.—(AP)—Rep. Engle (R-Calif.) wants to broaden the program to combat pine bark beetles and other forest pests.

He said that a bill he has introduced would expand the insect control program to areas under state and private ownership. It is now confined largely to federally-owned forests.

"Our forest resources are being seriously threatened by the pine bark beetle and similar pests, and unless action on a long-range program is taken immediately the situation may become hopelessly out of hand," Engle said.

He added that in the ponderosa pine belt California, Oregon and Washington approximately 16,000,000 board feet of commercial timber was destroyed by the bark beetle between 1931 and 1940. During a like period, he said, fires destroyed only 1,000,000,000 feet.
