Aid Offered Kin In Reburial Of War Two Dead

The Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs will assist next of kin of war service personnel buried overseas in filling out their forms, "Request for Disposition of Remains," Director George E. Sandy said today.

May 16, 1946, the War Department announced complete plans for repatriation of 325,000 World War II deceased military and naval personnel buried outside the continental United States. Letters of inquiry from the quartermaster general now are being mailed next of kin to determine the disposition of remains, although it may be a year before all inquiries are dispatched. The War Department has asked that the completed forms be returned within 30 days to expedite repatriation.

Under the law, families have the option of:

1. Burying the deceased in a permanent American military cemetery overseas.
2. Returning the remains to the United States or American possessions for burial by next of kin in a private cemetery. The government will pay \$50 toward the local burial expense.
3. Burying the deceased in his home land, if foreign born, provided the United States can obtain an entry permit.
4. Having the remains returned to the United States for final interment in a national cemetery near their home, at government expense.

The Salem office of the Department of Veterans Affairs in the State Library building, and the Portland office at 416 S. W. 11th avenue, are prepared to assist in completing and notarizing the form.

ply of milk from New Orleans. Illinois Central train No. 3 was stopped last night at Amite for the second time. There was no milk aboard and the farmers allowed the train to proceed. Trucks were halted there throughout the day but none was found to be carrying milk.

The strike was called Monday after New Orleans dairies had notified producers they were cutting the price of milk with four per cent butterfat from \$5.75 per hundredweight to \$5.20. Thousands of gallons of milk were dumped from truck and train shipments Tuesday.

Cameraman Manhandled

Bill Allen, Associated Press photographer, had his camera snatched away today when he tried to take pictures of a train search, and was warned against taking pictures with a borrowed one.

When his camera was returned, he said, he was told that it didn't matter if the camera were broken "because no more pictures are going to be taken."

Then several men seized Allen and one of them said "Let's hang the camera and get him out of the way." After several minutes of

discussion along this line, Allen was released and told to "forget you ever had a camera."

The photographer left shortly afterward to investigate the activities of strikers in the nearby town of Lorange.

"I understand the trees are skinnier over there," Allen told a friend. "I'm a pretty heavy man and I got to get away from these big strong trees at Amite. These are real hanging trees."

\$14,000,000 a year in the amount Oregonians pay in federal taxes, while opponents contend it would cause too many complications in other laws, such as those governing states.

Three members of the committee did not vote.

The Senate assessment and taxation committee will hold a hearing tonight on the 3 per cent sales tax bill, already passed by the house.

Eleven members of the California legislative committee on aviation conferred here yesterday with their opposite numbers from the Oregon legislature on proposals for uniform aviation legislation, particularly the taxation and airport support features. The move is the first step for uniform aviation laws among the 11 Western states.

County Pay Probe Asked

A resolution for an interim committee to investigate salaries paid to county officers was introduced by the Senate County Affairs Committee.

Bills passed by the House and sent to the Senate would increase jurors' fees from \$3 to \$5 a day, and let local agencies use parks for veterans' housing. The House sent to the governor bills to let the Highway Commission appoint its chief engineer. Also to permit school boards to excuse mentally unfit children from the compulsory school attendance law.

The Senate Resolutions Committee introduced a bill to reduce the number of Supreme Court justices from seven to five.

Timber Tax Voted

Governor Snell's \$500,000 annual forestry conservation and research program, already approved by the House, was passed 16 to 14 by the Senate yesterday.

but opponents gave notice they would ask for reconsideration of the bill today.

The measure, which would levy a tax of 10 cents a thousand feet on all timber cut in the state, was opposed bitterly by lumber interests, who believe the state as a whole should pay the cost.

Sen. William E. Walsh, Coos Bay, who was the leader of the opposition, charged that some senators who oppose the bill said they are voting for it "because they are on the governor's hook" and are thus committed to his program. Walsh said senators should represent the people, rather than the Executive Department.

The Senate, before taking the final vote, defeated 15 to 15 a move to exempt timber taken from government lands.

Walsh said the timber operators now are conducting vast reforestation operations, but they would stop them if the bill passed. Walsh also said the measure is unconstitutional.

Sen. George Winslow, Tillamook, leading the fight for the bill, said the timber operators should pay the tax because they are largely responsible for the denuding of the state's forest.

Action on Other Bills

The House concurred in the Senate amendments to House Bill 9 and sent it to the governor. The bill, passed by the Senate Tuesday, apportions the \$16,000,000 annual basic school support fund.

The Senate State Affairs Committee recommended passage of a House resolution for a constitutional amendment to limit legislative sessions to 60 days.
