Deadlock Grips Snell Bill on Reforestation

eral Neuner said it is constitutional. Opponents of the bill charged that Governor Snell has been putting tremendous pressure on the senators to vote for his bill, and the supporters of the measure say that the timber companies, who think the general public should pay the reforestation costs, have been applying pressure to kill it.

Session End Not in Sight—The Senate passed and sent to the governor a bill to permit elec-

tions to create People's Utility Districts to be held only at the same time as general elections.

A 50 per cent increase in industrial accident benefits was passed by the Senate and sent to the governor.

Hope of ending the long legislative session, which was in its 75th day today, before next Wednesday night was abandoned when leaders said the taxation and appropriation bills could not be passed before that time.

The bill to let counties have planning and zoning commissions, already passed by the House, was sent back to committee by the Senate for consideration of an amendment designed to prohibit mining dredge operations from destroying agricultural lands.

The Senate approved, 29 to 9, and sent to the House a proposed constitutional amendment which would allow property taxes to be assessed against motor vehicles, with the revenue to be used for general state and county purposes. Such revenue now has to be used to build and maintain roads.

School Law in Dispute—The House Education Committee refused to accept Senate amendments to the bill to change the rural district school law. The Senate voted to make the law effective Jan. 1, 1948, while the House wants it to go into effect a year later than that. The bill will go to a Senate-House Conference Committee.

The House Labor and Industries Committee voted to increase unemployment compensation benefits to a maximum of \$20 a week for 22 weeks in any one year. The Senate had voted for \$20 for 20 weeks, compared with the current scale of \$18 for 20 weeks. Labor had asked for \$25 for 26 weeks, and employers asked that no increase be allowed.

Welfare Funds Voted—The House suspended its rules yesterday to push passage of a bill to maintain the state's public welfare program until July 1.

The bill, which goes to the Senate, appropriates \$2,141,000 to make up the public welfare commission's shortage, and also provides funds for Multnomah county to pay its welfare costs for May and June. The measure also contains \$70,000 for expenses of holding special elections in counties which need to levy more property taxes to meet their part of the program.

The Senate passed and sent to the House bills to let the governor appoint pro tem county judges whenever a county judge is incapacitated and provide a new code on cemeteries, requiring death certificates before burial.

The House sent to the governor bills to make trucks have mudguards or fenders to prevent wheezy spray, and to increase salaries of district attorneys.

Margarene Receives OK—Despite opposition of representatives from dairy counties, the House approved and sent to the governor a bill to permit use of margarine in state institutions.

Interim committees to study sources of meat and veterans affairs would be provided in resolutions passed by the house and sent to the Senate.

Governor Snell signed into law a bill creating a state irrigation board, which would have power to combine districts for joint use of water.

Gov. Thompson Vetoes 'White Primary' Bill

ATLANTA, March 28.—(AP)—Governor M. E. Thompson yesterday vetoed the Talmadge-sponsored "white primary" bill.

The bill, which would have barred Negroes from Democratic primaries by making them "club affairs" of the party previously was signed by Herman Talmadge while he claimed to be governor. It was invalidated when the Supreme Court rejected Talmadge and was resubmitted to Thompson.

Senate Votes Increased Allowance of Sugar

WASHINGTON, March 28.—(AP)—The Senate voted, 49-32, yesterday to require that housewives be allowed 35 to 50 pounds of sugar this year for each member of the family. The ration last year was 25 pounds.

The Agriculture Department has estimated that the ration this year will be 35 pounds—and promised to make it more if supplies permit.

Traffic Crash Injures Mother of Dead Flier

SALEM, Ore., March 28.—(AP)—Mrs. T. W. Creech, who had received word only four days ago that her son, Lt. John W. Creech, had been killed in the crash of an Army plane in Ethiopia, was in a hospital today with head injuries as the result of an automobile accident late Wednesday.

She was riding in a car, driven by her husband, which collided with another car.
