Traffic Safety Leaflets Published for Four-H

Five thousand copies of "Four-H Club Traffic Safety" are being printed by the Traffic Safety Division of the office of Secretary of State Robert S. Farrell Jr. These are eight-page leaflets, designed to fit into the club's safety program, and are distributed through county agents to Four-H club leaders. This is the second

year that the leaflets have been published.

"Four-H Club Traffic Safety" reviews the traffic accident problem, with special emphasis on the rural situation. It gives tips on safe driving and walking practices, stopping distances, and handling a car in difficult terrain. Included is a check list covering vehicle condition. "Rural accidents claim three out of four traffic deaths in Oregon," Farrell noted. "Any sound measure aimed at protecting the people who must use the highways is worthwhile."
