Cordon Ponders Plan to Reduce Coast Guard Fund

WASHINGTON, April 1.—(AP)—The Coast Guard, given a \$35,904,490 wallowing by the House Appropriations Committee, which started at "grandiose designs" got a chance to carry its case to the Senate today.

Senator Cordon, of Oregon, chairman of a Senate appropriations subcommittee assigned to the \$3,202,050,750 House bill to finance the Treasury and Post-office Departments for the next fiscal year, planned to turn to the Treasury after another look at internal revenue bureau requirements.

Cordon first called back Joseph Nunan, Jr., international revenue commissioner, who reported yesterday that the House cut of \$30,000,000 in his division would mean a reduction of more than 6,000 enforcement officers and an estimated revenue loss of \$600,000,000 to the government.

Cordon said he wanted to be shown. He said he wanted to know whether cuts could not be made elsewhere, rather than concentrating them in the enforcement group.

He added, however, that if Nunan can make a case in favor of his contention that the reduction would cost the government money "it would be ridiculous" to pinch the bureau's funds.

"I feel our job is to reduce the cost of government," the Oregon Senator told a reporter, "and so far as we can get the information to follow, we should do it without using the meat ax."

The committee recommended \$97,000,000 for the Coast Guard compared with a budget bureau request for \$132,004,400 and a reported request by the Coast Guard to the treasury for \$232,000,000.

Acquitted Girl Faced By New Murder Charge

LOS ANGELES, April 1.—(AP)—Miss Ruth Helen McKenzie, 29, claimed her personal belongings at the county jail, bid good-bye to the matrons and said: "It's going to be nice to go home again."

She had just returned from nearby Torrance, where a police court judge had freed her of a murder charge in the stabbing of her fiancé, Jack Clifford Floyd, 31, in her apartment March 12.

But as she turned to leave the jail an investigator served her with a new murder warrant. Floyd died of a wound in the neck from a kitchen knife, Miss McKenzie insisted it was accidental, resulting from a "playful" gesture with the knife while they were discussing their forthcoming marriage.

Freshly-Picked Vegetables Only Kind for Freezing

Vegetables to be stored in home freezing units or lockers should be frozen, just as they should be cooked, as soon as possible after harvesting. This is the recommendation made by state experiment stations which have tested loss of flavor, tenderness and vitamin content in vegetables after the harvest.

"Prompt handling of garden products from harvesting to freezing is of the utmost importance," says extension bulletin 244 from the University of Minnesota. "For example, holding freshly picked peas in a warm room for 3 to 4 hours will materially toughen the skins. Losses of Vitamin C are greatest during this period."

One to two thirds of their original Vitamin C value, the bulletin says, may be lost by vegetables in 24 hours at room temperature. If necessary to hold overnight, they should be placed in a refrigerator or covered with crushed ice. Never try to hold them after shelling, slicing or scalding.

Peas are sweetest at dawn, according to the Washington State College, and if harvested then should be kept in a cold place until cooked, frozen or canned.

Spinach stored at room temperature lost 48 per cent of its Vitamin C content in 24 hours, according to the Oklahoma experiment station; and in six days it lost 91 per cent. Spinach is often six days on the way from field to the table.

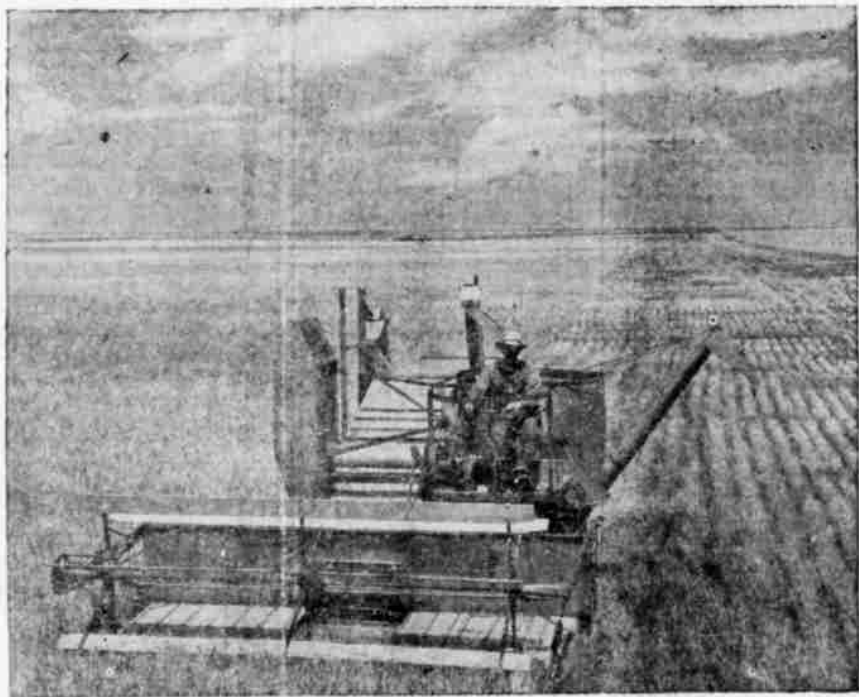
