Penalty for Refusing to Produce Records Upheld

WASHINGTON, April 1.—(AP)—The Supreme Court yesterday upheld a lower court order for imprisonment of a business man unless he produces records subpoenaed by the Securities Exchange Commission.

The U. S. Circuit Court in San Francisco ordered the imprisonment of A. W. Vance, an Angeleno, secretary-treasurer of the Peninsula Company of California.

The court also approved sale of the Pullman Company sleeping car business to a group of 43 railroads. The sale was opposed by the Justice department on the ground that it would merely substitute a "trust" for a "monopoly" for one which had been adjudicated illegal under the Sherman Anti-Trust Act.

The sale was approved by a 4 to 4 decision. Justice Jackson took no part in the case.
