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Health Assn. Of Douglas Launches 27th Fiscal Year

Today starts the 27th fiscal year of Douglas County's Public Health Association, a voluntary organization affiliated with the Oregon Association and the state's Tuberculosis Association. Organized May 11, 1921, Douglas County chapter's first pro-

ject was to obtain a county health nurse and became a reality in September of that year, following a hearing before the County Court which resulted in the group receiving financial appropriations from a fund at that time used by the court to chase bootleggers. First county nurse, paid by the association prior to 1921 because of lack of county funds, was Miss Caroline Wallace. Instrumental in obtaining a salaried nurse for the county through the Health Association was Dr. George E. Housh. Mrs. William Bell, Miss Jane C. Allen and Mrs. Sallie Orr-Dunbar, currently serving as executive-secretary of the Oregon State Tuberculosis Association.

Presided over by Mrs. Bell the first year of organization, Christmas Seal sales, the organization's only source of income, brought in \$53,146.

War of Tuberculosis is the main objective of the association and to accomplish this the detection of early cases through the use of chest x-rays is used.

In 1946 mobile x-ray units visited all parts of the county and took 110 chest x-rays free of charge to persons. Several new cases of tuberculosis were found and the individuals were enabled to start treatment early enough to effect prompt cure. Unit's Visit Scheduled

The association is now making arrangements for the 1947 tour of the unit from Portland which will spend two days in Roseburg and three days visiting other towns of Douglas County May 5 through May 9.

The objective of the x-rays is to find unknown cases of tuberculosis and bring them to attention of private physicians and the health department, with which the association works so that cases may be diagnosed and brought to the proper treatment to stop spread of infection.

Other noteworthy projects now being planned for the coming year by the Health Association are the purchase of a second hospital bed to be loaned out to needy families of the county, purchasing of educational health films for showing to school children and fixing of a budget for case handling, one of the organization's major activities.

Mrs. H. A. Watzig is president of the Douglas County Public Health Association. Other executive board members are: Mrs. Fritz Snyder, Days Creek; Mrs. John Edwards, Oakland; Mrs. Kenneth Adams, Mrs. William F. Amiot and Mrs. Ralph M. Church, Roseburg.

A MESSAGE FROM THE CHIEF OF STAFF



The Time of Need Is Now



The Selective Service System, which helped build so magnificent a wartime Army, is being discontinued as an immediate source of men for Army service. Its record is one of distinction, and the Nation's gratitude goes out to all those responsible for the efficient administration of that system, as well as to the millions of selected men who served with such courage and devotion.

From now on we are engaged in a great test, to see whether a system traditionally American in peacetime—the volunteer system—can give us the stable, well-trained Regular Army our current international commitments require.

We have come to a crucial turning point in the development of our military establishment. Building an all-volunteer Regular Army is not a job for the War Department alone; it is a job for the American people—a task of writing the insurance against the chaos of another war.

Here are the basic facts: To carry out our present assignments, we must maintain the Regular Army at a strength of 1,070,000 men. This will require a constant flow into the Army of 30,000 men a month. These men must be of high quality, and every one must be a volunteer. Thus we face a persistent question: Can we do the job?

The task is enormous. Never before have we even considered raising and maintaining a peacetime Regular Army of a million volunteers. There are no sign-posts to go by, no experience on which to base sure forecasts. But such obstacles have never deterred this Nation before.

I have confidence in the young men of America, whose opportunity it is to choose this fine profession. And I believe we can do the job—if we have three things: public understanding, public support and public action.

National observance of Army Day and Army Week is made possible by public support. This has come from the fine young soldiers who have volunteered, from individuals, and from organized groups. Now, as we strive to build a Regular Army to help enforce world peace and security, I ask those who have given so generously of their help to redouble their efforts.

They can do so in the knowledge that the United States Army offers able young Americans not only three things every man wants—good pay, a real career, a chance for advancement—but also the honor and dignity which is associated with national service in time of need.

The time of need is now.
