Gaming Levy Proposal Loses in Oregon House

will leave the state general fund with a deficit of \$2,927,000.

However, if revenues exceed estimates during the next biennium, the deficit might be almost wiped out. Should the deficit still be serious in 1948, then there probably would be a special election in November of that year to levy a property tax to make it up. This property tax would be offset by income tax revenues, so would not actually have to be levied.

The deficit also would be wiped out if the people pass the 3 percent sales tax bill.

The deficit estimate is based on the assumption that the legislature will approve such revenue measures as the cigarette tax, increased horse racing taxes, and transferring the amusement device tax to the general fund.

These taxes all have been approved by both houses, but agreement has to be reached on amendments to them.

Zoning Bill Approved — The County Zoning bill was passed, 25 to 2, yesterday by the Senate and sent to the Governor.

The measure provides for creation of county planning and zoning commissions to regulate development outside of cities.

Provisions that counties must hold elections before setting up their zoning program quieted most of the objections. If a county rejects zoning in such an election, then any area of at least two square miles could get zoning for its own area by petition to the county court.

Deficit Remedy Voted — The legislature's plan to insure the state against having a deficit at the end of the 1947-49 biennium was passed 25 to 3, by the Senate and sent to the Governor.

This bill provides that if a serious budget deficit exists on July 1, 1948, then the people should vote at the following general election in November, 1948, to levy a property tax to wipe out the deficit. This property tax, however, would not actually be levied, since there would be income tax revenues on hand to wipe it out.

The legislature is expected to leave a deficit of around \$4,000,000 when it ends its session, but if the 3 percent sales tax bill is approved by the people, or if other revenues exceed the estimates, the deficit might be eliminated before the special property tax election would be held.

The Senate approved and sent to the House a measure appro-

prating \$17,500 for statues of Jason Lee and Dr. John McLoughlin to be placed in Statuary Hall in the National Capitol.

The Senate passed, 23 to 5, and sent to the Governor a bill making old age payments a claim against the estate of any person receiving old age assistance.

Barracks Fund Voted — The only six dissenting votes, the House passed and sent to the Senate the bill appropriating \$620,000 to operate the Klamath Falls Marine barracks as a state vocational school during the next two years. The barracks will be obtained from the government for \$1.

Rep. Rose M. Poole, Klamath Falls, explained to the House that if there was no need for the school after 10 years, it could be turned back to the government. He said 25 to 30 skills and trades would be taught at the school.

The House approved and sent to the Senate a resolution to ratify the proposed 22nd amendment to the federal constitution to prevent any president from serving a third term.

The Senate measure to ban portal-to-portal overtime pay suits was rejected overwhelmingly by the House when attorneys doubted whether the bill is constitutional.

The House completed legislative action today on a resolution calling for appointment of an interim committee to study surface mining operations. The committee will study the problems of dredge mining, including proposals to make the dredge miners clean up their debris.
