Fire Kills 4 Children; Phone Service at Issue

ELMSFORD, N. Y., April 8.—(AP)—Four children were burned to death yesterday in a fire which destroyed their home.

Mrs. George Brown mother of three of the victims, was awakened shortly after 6 A. M., by flames. Patrolman John McMahon said she did not receive an answer from the telephone operator when she tried to call the fire department, rushed outside and sent in an alarm from a firebox.

The telephone strike became effective here at 6 A. M., but William O'Connor, telephone company manager, said sufficient supervisory personnel was on duty at the time to give normal service, particularly because of the low volume of calls at that hour.

The alarm was turned in at 6:10 A. M. and the firemen responded within several minutes.

Mother of Executed Boy Dies in 3-Story Plunge

BOSTON, April 8.—(AP)—Grieving for 12 years since the electrocution of her son, Abe, with the Millen brothers, Mrs. Rose Faber, 69, died today in a plunge from her third floor Roxbury tenement.

Resting on a table beside a chair where she apparently had been sitting just before the plunge was a photograph of her son in cap and gown upon his graduation from Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Young Faber was known as the brains of a gang that led him and the two Millens — Murton and Irving — to the electric chair in June 6, 1935 for the murder of a Needham policeman and a fireman during a bank holdup.

Americans Holding On To War Bond Savings

WASHINGTON, April 8.—(AP)—The American people are hanging on to their war bond savings this year in sharp contrast to the way they turned them in for cash in early 1946.

Treasury figures today showed that cash-ins of the Series E savings bond—the old "war bond"—were 38.5 per cent lower during the first three months of this year than the same period of 1946.

As a result, the Treasury sales of these bonds exceeded redemptions by \$325,146,000 during

the first quarter of this year. Redemptions exceeded sales by \$204,540,000 in the first quarter of 1946.

"Mad Pole" Air Hero of War 2 Killed in Crash

STEVENS POINT, Wis., April 8.—(AP)—Robert J. Klopotek, 25, known among his buddies of the World War II Ninth Airforce as the "Mad Pole," was killed yesterday with the pilot of a plane in which he was riding.

The plane, flown by Ray V.

Barber, a manufacturers' representative of Chicago, crashed in a jackpine thicket shortly after taking off.

During his three years in the air force, Klopotek won the Distinguished Flying Cross and the Air Medal with 23 oak leaf clusters. Klopotek was credited with shooting down four German planes.
