Prosecutions Under Rent Control Law Given O. K.

WASHINGTON, April 8. — The Supreme court yesterday reversed a lower court decision that the government could not begin prosecutions after June 30, 1946, for violations of the old rent price control law which expired on that date.

The U. S. district court in Philadelphia had dismissed charges filed against two landlords August 29, 1946. They were accused of collecting, before the old law's expiration, rents which exceeded OFA ceilings.

The district court said that after the emergency price control act expired June 30, 1946, prosecutions were then restricted to cases already started. The Justice Department, in appealing to the Supreme court, contended the government still had the right to begin prosecutions for violations committed any time during the life of the price control act.

Sen. Morse Raps Both Sides in Phone Strike

WASHINGTON, April 8. — Senator Morse of Oregon, former member of the War Labor board, said yesterday the responsibility for the telephone strike "must be placed upon both the company and the union."

"The companies are at fault for having restricted their proposals for arbitration to such narrow terms of reference as to make it impossible for a board of arbitration to render a fair decision on causes of the dispute," Morse said.

"The union has shown bad faith by trying to force a nationwide arbitration of many issues that should be arbitrated on local or regional basis."

He suggested both sides "show good faith" by allowing Secretary of Labor Samuel Hays to draft an arbitration agreement and submit all issues to arbitration.

\$33 Million From Snuff Industry Not To Be Sneezed At

AP Newsfeature Writer NEW YORK — When Mrs. Henrietta Garrett died recently in Philadelphia, she left a \$33-million-dollar estate, all of it accumulated in the manufacture of snuff.

Snuff, evidently, is nothing to be sneezed at. It is, in fact, a multi-million dollar industry. About 40 million pounds a year is produced, frequently in highly unusual containers, by some five million Americans.

Pipe, cigar and cigarette smokers often suffer from the delusion that snuff users whiff a bit of the powder and then flirt around with a handkerchief until the episode is terminated by a gigantic sneeze.

That is an 18th Century European technique which Americans have never adopted. Our five million almost without exception either chew or "dip" snuff.

In a world eager for change, snuff seems to be an exception. Odd Containers in Favor

For years manufacturers have been packing large lots in containers made from cured tree membranes of cattle, called "wascans."

The snuff trade buys them by the gross because there exists an ancient and widespread belief that such containers enhance the flavor and quality of snuff. The manufacturers don't comment on this. They also put out snuff in paper, tin and glass containers—but most haven't changed their labels since the 1870s.

There are almost as many types of snuff as there are of cigars. These have interesting and tradition-laden names, including Scotch, Irish, Welsh, Swedish, French, macouba, Copenhagen and Rarities. Flavored Imported

Manufacturers talk and treat their formulae and products as wine producers treat their vintages—with secrecy and loving care. They fuss constantly over the flavoring and the aging.

The dark-fired tobacco ground for snuff is highly cured and repeatedly fermented until most of the nicotine has been worked out. Then it is flavored with such agents as salt, sugar, cinnamon, cloves, cassia, tonka beans, attar of roses, wintergreen and mint. Some super types have sold for as much as \$25 an ounce, but they were specially prepared for an Indian maharajah who insisted it be packed in gold foil.

When Bulbs Finish Bloom Here's How One Can Save 'em

The first thing to do with bulb plants that have finished blooming is to remove the spent blooms. The impulse to form seed draws heavily from the reserve strength of the bulbs, making it obvious that the sooner the spent blooms are removed, the more energy will be preserved to form the embryo for next year's crop of blooms.

Even though it may be unsightly, every bit of foliage should be left to dry back normally to the degree where it becomes dry and brittle and may be easily twisted from the bulb. Then only should the bulb be lifted, exposed to the drying rays of the sun for a day or so, and stored in a cool dry place to await bulb planting time in fall.

Members of the Narcissus family, which includes Daffodils and Jonquils, need not be lifted more often than every fourth or fifth year, because they will stand moisture without rotting, during their dormant period.

Tulips are usually best lifted each year, excepting that the bed in which they are planted can be left unwatered throughout the summer months. Tulips left in the garden bed will recur to a certain extent, but there will always be misses, because of rot or splitting of bulbs, so it is better to lift them each year.

The small bulbs, such as the Lilies, Sparaxis, Freesias, Muscari (Grape Hyacinths), Crocus, Scilla (Wood Hyacinths), etc., may be left to naturalize, if reasonable care was taken at the time they were planted to secure good drainage by surrounding them with sand.

If the space occupied by bulb plants is desired for the planting of Summer annuals, the bulbs may be lifted with all the soil it is possible to handle, and transferred to a trench where they may be left to cure in the normal manner.

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bulbs during the curing period may be relieved by interplanting with dwarf French Marigolds, Pom Pom Asters, Nemesis, Ageratum, Annual Phlox or any half-dwarf growing Annuals available as plants at the close of the bulb season.
