Sessions of the two-day annual meeting of the Southwest Oregon Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church closed yesterday, with the election of delegates and alternates to the general assembly, to be held at Grand Rapids, Mich., in May.

The Rev. Hugh Bronson, Tulalake, Calif., and Elder Otto L. Niedermeyer, Jacksonville, Ore., were chosen as delegates to represent this Presbytery at the national meeting.

Selected as alternates were the Rev. Hugh Mitchellmore and Dr. George I. Wright, an elder, both of Klamath Falls.

At a noon luncheon at the First Baptist Church yesterday, Dr. Morgan S. Odell, president of Lewis and Clark College at Portland, gave a progress report and showed pictures of his institution. During the afternoon, reports of the church's pension system for its ministers, and of the various committees of the Presbytery, were given.

Resolutions thanking the local church and the city for their hospitality were passed.

No date or place for the next annual meeting of the Presbytery was set. Ministers and an elder from each church, however, will attend meetings of the Synod of Oregon, state-wide organization of the Presbyterian Church.

Mrs. F. DeBruin, Native of Douglas County, Passes

Mrs. DeBruin was a popular Portland clubwoman. She took part in many philanthropic activities and was chairman of the Portland Red Cross.

Funeral services were held Monday with interment in the Portland Mausoleum.

Strikes-Curb Bill Drawn for House Group

right to ask for a court order to stay off or stop the tie-up.

The injunction would be good for 75 to 90 days. During that time, mediation and arbitration would be tried. If that failed the union still could strike, but the government could also get another injunction and try again.

A few, independent administrators of the labor relations law would investigate cases, present them to the board, and take decisions into court for enforcement, if necessary.

Across the capital, indications were that a milder bill before the Senate Labor Committee probably will be toned down even more when the members start voting on it Friday.

As it stands, the preliminary Senate draft outlaws the closed shop, authorizes temporary injunctions to block serious strikes, prohibits secondary boycotts and jurisdictional strikes, and makes numerous Wagner act changes designed to "restore justice in relations between employers and employees."

Morse in Opposition

Announcing his own opposition to the omnibus labor bill on which Senate committee action is due tomorrow, Senator Morse of Oregon today said he thinks "every employer in America" should oppose it.

Morse said he believed Congress should pass separate bills dealing with individual aspects of labor relations.

A former member of the National War Labor Board, Morse said in a statement:

"I strongly favor the passage of labor bills dealing with individual issues such as amending the Wagner act to hold unions responsible for unfair labor acts

and responsible for breach of their contracts." Other bills, he said, should be passed to:

(1) Regulate checkoff of dues; (2) to provide an independent mediation, conciliation and arbitration service; and (3) to provide a board of inquiry to make public its findings prior to cessation of work in so-called "national paralysis" cases.

Safety Urge Backed

Morse said yesterday he plans to introduce legislation "seeking to place criminal responsibility" on coal mine owners for unsafe mines.

He told the Senate that while he holds "no brief" for John L. Lewis, United Mine Workers chief, he thought Lewis was right "when he said 'too much coal goes into our homes and our factories covered with blood.'" Morse added:

"We can keep the blood off of it by seeing to it that legislation is passed to enforce safety in the mines."

Morse said also that if mine operators are unable to pay miners satisfactory wages, then "a friendly government" should pay a subsidy to make this possible.

Boy Scouts to Get Life Saving Course at U. O.

Arrangements have been made for local Boy Scouts to take group swimming instructions at the University of Oregon, for both beginning and advanced classes.

This will include some life saving instruction.

"We believe that everyone will make a lot of progress toward completion of the work necessary for first class swimming and the merit badge awards," said Jim Stoen, camping and activities chairman for the Scouts.

These classes will be held at the university men's pool in Eugene on the following dates: April 10, 17 and 24, and May 1, 8 and 15, beginning each evening at 7:30 P. M. To make this appointment, the bus will leave from Roseburg at 5 P. M., meeting at the Presbyterian Church.

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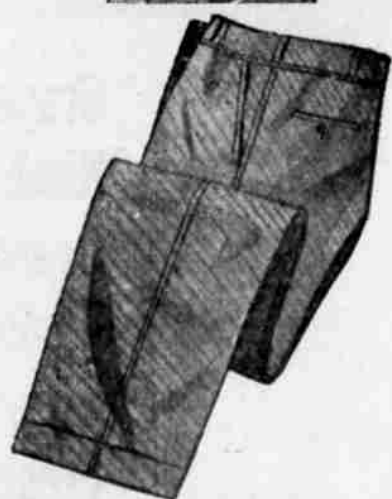
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
