RHS Track Team
Shapes for Relays

Jack Newby's Roseburg Indian track team began workouts and time trials yesterday for competition in the 10th Hayward Relays at Eugene Friday and Saturday. Oregon's replica of the Penn Relays, staged on the University of Oregon's Hayward Field, is expected to duplicate the record-breaking 1946 field of nearly 60 high schools and 700 athletes.

While the Roseburg crew bowed to Cottage Grove in its season's initial meet Tuesday, Newby has great confidence in Ed Harvey, 440 and 100-yard dash man and Eugene Carr, promising pole vaulter, and expects them to gain recognition among the "A" school division Friday.

Roseburg will be defending its distance medley record established in the 1946 Relays with three of last year's sprinters in the lineup. Last year's team consisted of Ed Harvey, Art Backlund, Rick Chartier and Bob Strizke, with a time of 11:30 on basis of one man at 440 yards, one at 880, one at 1,320 and one at the mile.

The "A" division events will be held Friday, starting at 1:30 P. M.
