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Elks Band Planning Summer Concerts

An extensive program of concerts is planned for members of the Roseburg Elks band this summer. Lem E. Bitner, director, announced today.

Full coverage of Douglas County is planned, he said, with concerts tentatively scheduled in 10 communities, including Reedsport, Elkton, Drain, Yoncalla, Oakland, Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek, Days Creek, Riddle and Glendale, as well as weekly appearances in Roseburg.

Sponsored by Lodge 326, the band will be outfitted with uniforms borrowed from the Portland lodge for appearances at the state convention at Coos Bay in June and the national conclave at Portland in August.

Although the site of the annual summer concerts for Roseburg has not yet been decided, the band is expecting to play for occasional baseball games and at city softball games. Musical selections are now being arranged by Bitner for the Douglas County Sheriff's posse Rodeo. Bitner asks all instrumental musicians interested in joining the band to attend rehearsal at the Elks Club Tuesday nights of each week.
