London's Latest Bomb Scare Proves Unfounded

LONDON, April 17.—(AP)—A new bomb scare in jittery London turned out today to be unfounded, but Scotland Yard agents undertook a nationwide drive to prevent the spread of Palestine's violence to Britain.

A day after a home-made time bomb was discovered in the colonial office building, a cardboard container which officials said appeared to have a fuse attached, was found in the busy Charing Cross post office in the heart of London.

The container was doused in water and rushed to the home office, but laboratory experts there found it contained only rubbish. Officials linked yesterday's bomb attack with the Palestine Jewish underground.

Slot Machines, Pinball Hit By Court Decision

OLYMPIA, Wash., April 17.—(AP)—Spokane courts dealt a dollar blow to state tax revenues in decisions banning pinball and slot machines in the Inland Empire city, the State Tax Commission disclosed today.

A previous day's Superior Court ruling outlawing slot machines in private clubs was followed yesterday in Spokane by a Federal Court denial of a temporary restraining order to halt enforcement of a city ban against pinball machines.

The Tax Commission said \$745,146 was collected on the machines in Spokane last year. More than in any other city of the state. Action of the recent legislature in doubling the tax to 20 per cent on pinballs and 40 per cent on slot machines was expected to increase the state's share.

In denying the petition for the restraining order, Federal Judge Black held pinball machines to be a lottery and cited a decision of the Oregon State Supreme Court to that effect.

Spokane, the court said, "has been a paradise for pinball operators" for 10 years, "but there are no squatter rights to violators of the law."

The petition was sought by Jack R. Moore and Company, an Oregon corporation. The latest decision, coupled with the preceding day's ruling against slot machines, cleared the way for enforcement of city ordinances banning devices of both types. It went into effect today.

Statewide collections on 12,250 pinballs and 2,650 slot machines netted the state \$3,028,952 during 1946, the Tax Commission said.

Alaska Statehood Needed for U. S. Safety, Krug Says

WASHINGTON, April 17.—(AP)—Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug told a House Subcommittee yesterday statehood for Alaska is essential to the security of the United States.

He asked a House territories subcommittee to give Alaska "the same consideration it gave to Hawaii."

The committee several weeks ago approved a Hawaiian statehood bill. It now is considering similar legislation as to Alaska. Krug declared Alaska is becoming a vital center for future trade with Asia. He added:

"The Great Circle air force from San Francisco to Japan by way of the Aleutian Islands is about 1,700 miles shorter than the old route by way of the Hawaiian Islands. It will probably become the principal air route to Japan and China."

Krug recalled Alaska was purchased by the United States from Russia 80 years ago, and first petitioned for active participation in 1872. It now is represented in Congress by a delegate who sits with the House but has no vote.

Alaska would be the largest state, twice the size of Texas, Krug said, adding: "One of the frequently advanced arguments against statehood for Alaska is that the population is too sparse. Alaska has about 90,000 people, twelve present-day states had a smaller population at the time of their admission."

Stickers Presage New Steel Strike

PITTSBURGH, April 17.—(AP)—Stickers proclaiming "no contract, no work" are appearing on steel workers' automobiles these days and a few have even been plastered in the United Steelworkers offices here, possible portent of a major steel strike after April 30.

That's the expiration date of the present contract extension between the CIO union and the United States Steel Corp. The original pact ran out Feb. 15 but was extended by mutual agreement.

The steelworkers, who have given no official blessing to the sticker campaign, explained the seals were brought here earlier in the week by Chicago members of the steelworkers' committee negotiating a new wage contract with "Big Steel."

The seals, borrowing a line often used by the nation's miners, read simply: "Deadline April 30 no contract—no work."

An official pronouncement on the negotiation with U. S. Steel and the other steel makers will be forthcoming next Monday through the union's wage and policy committee which will ratify proposals made by the executive committee Saturday and Sunday.

Palestine Probe Limit to be Asked

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., April 17.—(AP)—A British spokesman said today his country would propose exclusion of all five major powers from the proposed committee of inquiry on Palestine which will be considered by the special session of the United Nations assembly beginning April 28.

Britain also was reported opposed to granting committee representation to either Jews or Arabs. The committee's task will be to sift all available information on the Palestine problem and make recommendations to the regular assembly session meeting in September.

Under the British plan, the spokesman said, the committee would comprise about a dozen small powers who have little or no direct interest in the highly controversial question, so that it could avoid the pressure which might result if interested parties were represented.

Delegates submitted written questions on atomic control and inspection today for the Soviet Union to answer.

Following procedure agreed upon in a closed session, members of the working committee of the commission shaped their queries in writing—and Andrei A. Gromyko, Soviet delegate, was expected to answer in writing.

Delegates intimated that the question in which most were interested was this:

"Does Russia want inspection of atomic plants by international personnel responsible to an international agency or does Russia want inspection by national per-
