RHS Will Enter Strong Squad At Hayward Relays

Roseburg's Indians will enter a well-balanced squad of tracksters in the 10th annual Hayward Relays, Oregon High School track classic, tomorrow at Eugene. Coach Jack Newby reported today.

A quartet of juniors will make up the distance medley squad with Coleman Phillips running the 440, Eugene Kruse, 880; Art Bachlund, 1320, and Dick Stritzke, mile.

At yesterday's workout Bachlund turned in a 3:19 three-quarter mile and is expected to improve on this exceedingly good early season time on the fast cinders at Hayward Field.

The mile relay, record of which is held by Roseburg from 1946's showing at the relays, is also expected to boost Indian points in the all-state showing as Gene Kruse and Ed Harvey each turned in 54 second quarter-miles yesterday. The relay quartet consists of Bob Feldkamp, Phillips, Kruse and Harvey.

While fourth man of the sprint medley will not be determined until this afternoon, Newby reports it will be between Spud Rogers, driving sprinter of Junior High, and Red Davis, sophomore. Others of the team are Lloyd Mayborne, Zeke Walton and Ed Harvey.

In the field events John Ulrich, Daryl Blanck and Jerry Hammer or Harry Hagen will make up the discus and shotput trio. Eugene Carr, sleek-footed, sophomore, will handle the pole vault, and Doug Keene, senior, the javelin.

Dates for the 1947 4-H Summer School at Oregon State College have been set for June 17 to 27. Plans are to take approximately 80 boys and girls from Douglas County to the annual session according to Kenneth Minnick, county club agent. Four-H boys and girls attending will do so on scholarships provided by grantee, community clubs, PTA groups and individual sponsors. To date money has been received to sponsor 28 boys and girls. Scholarships sponsored to date include three from the Lookingglass PTA, three from Edenbower Community Club, two each from Melrose and Azalea Granges and one each from Sutherlin, Fair Oaks, Camas Valley, South Umpqua, Smith River and Winchester Bay Granges. Two scholarships sponsored by the J. C. Penney Company will be awarded outstanding 4-H clothing club members at the Spring Achievement Days, to be held May 16 and 17. The Sutherlin Lions Club has turned in money to sponsor two scholarships for club members in Sutherlin. The Glide PTA group also has provided money for two scholarships. Four scholarships have been received that can be awarded to any boy or girl in the county that is eligible to attend Summer School on basis of years in club work and completed projects.
