Hospital License, Other Bills Given Snell's Approval

SALEM, Ore., April 18.—(AP)—Governor Snell signed into law today the bill giving the State Board of Health authority to inspect and license hospitals. The bill was passed in order to bring hospitals up to standards where they can receive federal aid.

Other bills signed today: S. B. 47, by Mack. Makes persons acting as labor contractors subject to laws relating employment agencies. S. B. 117, by Labor and Industries Committee—restricts unemployment benefits for persons who quit jobs voluntarily.

S. B. 120, by Labor and Industries Committee—changes date for computing employers' unemployment compensation merit rating from December 1 to June 1.

H. B. 437, by Elections Committee—Relating to delivering of elections certificates.

H. B. 498, by Joint Ways and Means Committee—Declares void any transfer of property by a person for the purpose of getting old age assistance.

H. B. 508, by Judiciary Committee—Lets State Land Board compromise claims and judgments.

H. B. 538, by Joint Ways and Means Committee—Appropriates \$700,000 for orphans and delinquent girls.

H. B. 548, by Joint Ways and Means Committee—Appropriates \$255,603 for State Department of Education, \$408,358 for vocational education, and \$250,121 for state library.

H. B. 552, by Joint Ways and Means Committee—Appropriates \$10,000 for experimental fur farm unit.

H. B. 555, by Joint Ways and Means Committee—Appropriates funds to pay special damages to Francis M. Tubbs, widow of a state policeman who was killed in line of duty.

H. B. 183, by Van Dyke—Permits attorney to be discharged at any time during court proceedings.

H. B. 234, by Military Affairs Committee—Authorizes purchase of quonset huts to train National Guard units.

Profits accrue to individual companies and are only tabulated on the average of the aggregate. 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State Police Head Gets General Rank In National Guard

SALEM, Ore., April 18.—(AP)—Appointment of State Police Supt. Harold G. Malsion as a brigadier general of the National Guard has been approved by the War Department, Governor Snell has announced.

Malsion is expected to become assistant division commander of the 41st infantry division, which includes the National Guard of Washington and Oregon.

When World War II started, Malsion was a captain commanding the Salem Company of the 41st division. He rose to the rank of colonel, commanding an infantry regiment of the 6th (Philippine) division in the Philippines.

The commanding general of the 41st will be appointed from the Washington National Guard, with the command to alternate between Washington and Oregon every four years.

Malsion fought with the 41st through the New Guinea campaign.
