18-Month, Bloody Rail Strike Ends

PEORIA, Ill., April 21.—(AP)—The bloody, 18-month-old strike of 13 brotherhoods against the Toledo, Peoria and Western Railroad came to an end Thursday night, a little more than a month after the president of the 235-mile line had been slain from ambush.

Executors of the estate of George P. McNear, Jr., the 55-year-old assassinated rail head, announced a verbal "mutually satisfactory" agreement had been reached and that the strikers probably would return to work Monday.

Details of the settlement still remained to be worked out but a union spokesman said they probably would be signed next Monday.

McNear, who stoutly resisted the union demands for working rules similar to those in operation on other railroads, was shot down as he was taking a customary stroll near his home the night of March 10. His slayer,

for whom a total of \$40,000 in rewards has been posted, has not been apprehended.

The strike was estimated by a spokesman for the railroad's officials to have cost the company more than \$2,000,000 in revenue and the approximately 600 striking and non-striking employees more than \$1,000,000 in wages.

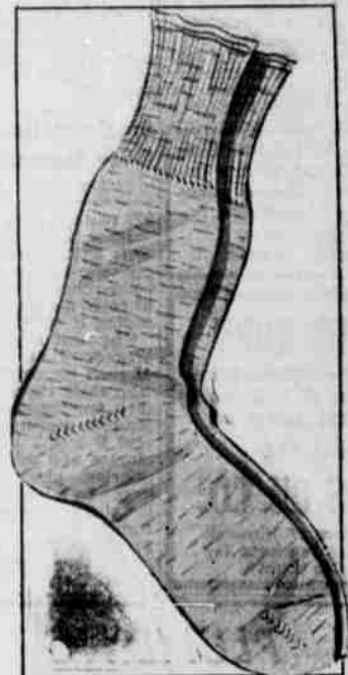

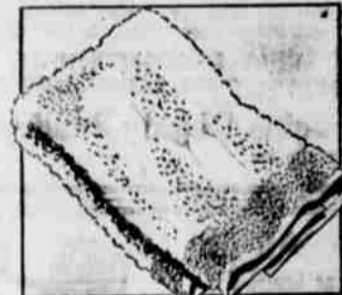

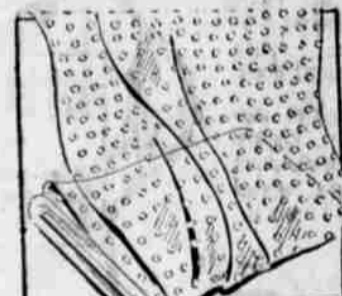
