THIS writer, after dreaming for

the brave new world, has about
reached the cynical conclusion
that IN THE MEANTIME we'd

We've all learned by sad ex-
perience in the past year or so
that the things we accomplish by
hard work GET US SOME-
WHERE, whereas pipe-dreaming
without work seems merely to
set us back on our heels.

BIG Steel's new wage contract
(which, it is hoped, will assure
peace in the industry for at
least a year, and maybe longer)
is signed in Pittsburgh by rep-
resentatives of management and
the CIO steelworkers.

After the signatures have been
affixed, Charles R. Cox, president
of Carnegie-Illinois Steel
Corporation, one of Big Steel's
subsidiaries, tells the union rep-
resentatives:

"We have a great deal of faith
in your leader (Murray). We are
taking a big step and we are tak-
ing it because we have faith."

(THE big step Big Steel is tak-
ing is raising wages to offset
living costs that ALREADY
have taken place and announcing
that it will do its best to get away
with the increase without raising
prices.)

IT looks like Big Steel is going
ahead in good faith to do
something to stop the whizzing
spiral of inflationary cost in-
creases that is rushing us toward
ruin.

For years we've knicked busi-
ness in the pants at every oppor-
tunity. Why not give Big Steel
the benefit of the doubt and con-
cede that it may have sincere and
patriotic motives?

Assuming that ALL business is
necessarily crooked hasn't got us
very far in any direction we want
to go.

WHILE we're at it, let's give
the steel-workers a hand. If,
in Murray, they have a leader in
whom business can HAVE
FAITH, they've made a long
step forward.

FISH DERBIES DISLIKED

The Oregon Wildlife Federation at its district convention in The Dalles last weekend took one action which may arouse resentment in some communities. Delegates to the convention voted unanimously to oppose sports fish derbies.

Fish derbies have become quite extensive, particularly along the coast. Kivalyn is keen. Each community tries to outdo its neighbors in number and value of prizes. Already some Oregon towns are advertising automobiles, motorboats, refrigerators, etc., as a lure to full salmon fishermen. One of the largest derbies is sponsored at Astoria, attracting anglers from many states.

Coastal towns have found fish derbies profitable ventures. Each fisherman drops a registration fee (usually \$1) into the pot. Hotels, motels, camps, restaurants, service stations, dock operators, tackle shops, guides, etc., all do a flourishing business. Thousands of dollars are placed in circulation. Naturally, rivalry for this business is keen and competition is growing.

Communities profiting from fish derbies probably will resent the Federation's action, as will the owners of business enterprises who enjoy the ringing sound of cash registers.

But fish derbies are not in keeping with conservation practices. When an angler fishes for a cash award or for a prize he becomes, in effect, a commercial fisherman. Experience has shown that the lure of prizes results in disobedience to law. Not only do fishermen exceed limits, but in many cases will continue long after they have caught the number of fish allowed them by law, and, upon occasion, have been known to throw back surplus fish when larger and more likely prize prospects were taken. Furthermore, derbies act to centralize fishing intensity, thus reducing escapement percentages. Incited by the opportunity to win valuable prizes, anglers concentrate their energies and make work of their fishing, rather than enjoying the purely recreational side of their excursion, and by diligent and prolonged exercise of skill take more fish than would be captured if prizes were not posted.

Derbies would be less objectionable if it were not for the competition between communities. Originally, prizes were of minor value and were designed to increase the angler's interest than to arouse his avarice. But when \$1,000 checks, new automobiles, etc., are posted as prizes, fishing ceases to be sport, and destruction of fishlife mounts in proportion to the value of awards.

With the rapid increase of population in Oregon and neighboring states, our coastal streams cannot long withstand the concentrated intensity of fishing now experienced. By removing nets from coastal streams, the volume of sports fishing could be very greatly increased without material damage. Derbies, then, perhaps, would be less dangerous, although remaining objectionable to the true sportsman. A limit exists, however, to the amount of sports fishing a stream can sustain. The Rogue River, which yielded from 16,000 to 19,000 salmon in the lower 12 miles of water in 1945, and from 25,000 to 30,000 steelhead between Savage Rapids and Galice, has, for instance, about reached its limit, a fact evidenced by declining migration tallied at counting stations.

While frowning on fish derbies, the Oregon Wildlife Federation voted encouragement to a different type of contest. It is urging all clubs throughout the state to organize "predator derbies." It seeks reduction of animals and birds preying on fish life. It urges pest hunts to aid farmers in control of destructive birds and animals, as well as predators preying upon upland birds. The Federation has requested the state Fish and Game Commissions to conduct joint studies to determine the amount of loss to fish life from seals and sea lions, mergansers, cormorants, etc., and to direct destruction of those found to be responsible for greatest damage.

The school is one of the 53 trade schools operated by the Navy and designed to qualify for a civilian trade upon leaving the service.

Boy Swept to Death in Nine-Mile Sewer Line

BOSTON, April 24.—(AP)—The body of a three-year-old Jamaica Plain boy, who toppled through an open manhole, was found last night lodged against an outlet screen at the Nut Island pumping station after passing through nine miles of sewer pipes.

The victim, Anthony Tammara, dropped through the opening while he and his brother, John, 4, were tossing stones in a nearby brook.
