"Especially fine" singing by the Roseburg High School sophomore girls' Triple Trio drew the compliments of judges Friday and Saturday, in the Southern Oregon Music Festival held at Ashland.

Although non-competitive, singing groups entered in the festival were graded on eight points set up by the National School Vocal Association. Conrad Sandvig of Montana State College acted as adjudicator.

The Triple Trio was awarded the highest A grade on each of the eight points: Interpretation, intonation, accuracy, rhythm, tone, diction, presentation, and appearance. They were "outstanding" in tone quality, according to the judge's comment.

The Triple Trio was organized last year under direction of Mrs. Omar J. Monger, who also directed the Senior High girls' quartet, rated high in the festival.

The advanced girls' chorus under direction of Bruce Gilley made a showing in the choral division, earning grades of A and B on the eight points. Members of the Roseburg High School band, also under Gilley's direction, participated in the massed festival band.

Final concert of the festival featured the massed girls' and mixed choruses and massed orchestras and bands, all chosen from the 20 schools participating in the festival.

The choruses consisted of 600 voices, while 300 instrumentalists performed with the band. Outstanding guest leaders conducted the concert.

The group was organized by Mrs. Monger last year, while ninth graders at the Junior

High School. They have continued under Mrs. Monger's direction this year, in the Senior High School.

The quartet was organized this year for the first time. It includes Sue Hahn, first soprano; Delores Wilson, second soprano; Joyce Graham, first alto, and Pauline Miller, second alto.

These girls were described by judges at the music festival as "outstanding" in their intonation and unification qualities. They were given a "superior" rating.

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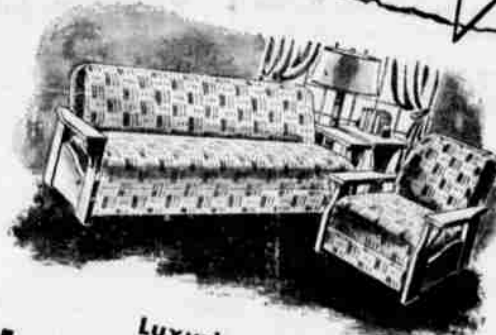
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
